## Nether Heyford Village Hall



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The January 10th, 2022, Parish Council meeting was held in the Baptist Church Rooms. As Covid had flared up again the meeting was a reduced one in terms of the number of Councillors attending; in order to try and keep both Councillors and public as safe as possible.

**Public Participation:** A resident complained that the footpath alongside the green on Bugbrooke road had become narrowed, and the grass needed cutting back.

#### Reports

**Lights** New contractors had informed Clerk that they had ordered parts for a number of lights which they would not get until later this month. A number of lights have been out for some time. Unfortunately, there is no alternative but to wait for the parts to arrive.

**Roads and pavements** No change, many areas in poor condition. council had heard that new signage would be installed on Furnace Lane. CK would ask Highways for some Council input into the signs. Council shared Mr Andrews concerns as to the state of the road (edges collapsing) opposite his house.

The Memorial Green had been damaged by a vehicle belonging to contractors working on installation of broadband, but nobody would admit liability. Mr Cawley to look at the damage, but it was felt that there was no point replacing the bollards until the installation work had finished. Subsequently Mr Cawley repaired the damage and Council would like to thank him for his swift and public-spirited action.

**Playing Fields** It was reported that a lack of volunteers was threatening the future of the facilities. It was hoped that residents would come forward to replace those now retiring.

**Allotments** Rents had started to come in. C£200 collected already in advance of the rent night on Jan 20th.

JBB Meeting set for Jan 31st.

Youth Club valuation request complied with.

**Defibrillators** Checked and in working order.

Website LH reported that the website had been updated

#### **Land behind Denbrook**

The question of the strip of access land was raised as this is not as wide as the access required by Highways. It is 3.5 M as opposed to the required 4.5M. The question of an easement was raised.

Resolved. Council to write to the Developer's agent to ask how they intended to proceed. Residents continued to be upset that WNC appeared unwilling to enforce the conditions that they had themselves set regarding the size and nature of the house, the wall surrounding the property and the entrance requirements.

**Neighbourhood Plan Draft response** It was reported that there had been 22 responses and that written answers would be provided for each. He does not think major changes will be needed to the existing plan, but feels it will come to the March (rather than the February) meeting

To engage with Northants CALC Asset Mapping Project (AMP) & to appoint an AMP Working Group comprising clerk & 2 councillors. Resolved. Cllrs Kiloh and Williams and Clerk to form an AMP Working Group. NCALC will provide funding for costs and staff overtime.

To approve a budget for 2022/23. Resolved To set a budget of £96,640 for the year and to demand a Precept of £95,000.

Bollards outside the One Stop shop Highways action in inserting these had caused considerable controversy and upset. Highways had informed Council that the bollards had been put in place by the Road Safety Team because of repeated complaints from residents, some of whom use mobility scooters, that they were unable to access the pavement safely at the dropped curbs. This was because of drivers ignoring the white lines painted on the road, and parking across the dropped curb. The Road Safety Team felt that the bollards would force some drivers to park in more appropriate location, and remind them to avoid blocking the dropped curves They also feel that these measures show that they take matters of road safety and disabled access seriously.

Councillors felt that the bollards did not suit the location, but they were deliberately "high visibility" as part of their function. It was also felt that they were not working, because they had not stopped drivers parking inconsiderately on the dropped curb nearest to the One Stop shop, and possibly made this more likely by having removed 2 parking places. Numerous photographs had been posted on social media showing vehicles parked across the dropped curbs. These concerns had been communicated to Highways.

Parish Council meetings in 2022 will be on the first Monday of each month, (unless a Bank Holiday) and would start at 19.30. The next ones are on Monday Feb 7th and Monday March 10th. Full meetings.

Reporting Highway and Footpath Issues. The Clerk will report issues that Council is made aware of, but Council would encourage residents to use the Fixmystreet service to report issues themselves as there will then be no time lag; and first-hand reports are almost always better than 2nd or 3rd hand reports. Streetlights within the village can be reported to the Clerk, who will report them to the maintenance company. Please do not report to Balfour Beatty as they deal only with major Highway lights – i.e., motorway, A5 and A45.

#### Dear Friends

I recently finished reading a book entitled 'How Happiness Happens' by the American author and popular theologian, Max Lucado. In the last chapter of the book, entitled 'The Happiness Challenge', the author tells the story of the most remarkable game of American Football. It was a match in 2017 between the University of Southern California – the Trojans - and Western Michigan. With just over three minutes to go, USC scored a touchdown and took an unassailable lead. At that point, the USC coach called for a substitute, Jake Olsen, to take the field to deep-snap (pass) the football back to the kicker for the extra point. The remarkable thing about this act was that Jake Olsen was blind.

As an infant, Jake Olsen had lost one eye to cancer. In his early teens, the cancer returned and Jake – a huge Trojans fan - lost his other eye. Before that second loss, the USC coach had done all he could to fill the boy's head with football memories – he met the players, he took place in the pre-match huddles and so on. But then came the darkness. After recovering from surgery, Jake attended team practice, where he received a rapturous welcome. Eventually, Jake learned to deep-snap a football. Blindness prevented him from running, tackling or catching, but he could pass the ball between his legs to a catcher eight yards away. So Jake learned to do just that, and it became his dream to play in one game for the Trojans.

To make that happen, the coaches of the two teams had to talk, and agree the conditions under which Jake might play a part in the match. But with three minutes left, and a 17-point lead, Jake's moment came. The ball was placed. Jake stepped up. The referee's whistle blew, and Jake spiralled a perfect pass to the kicker, whose kick was good. The extra point was scored and Jake was mobbed by his teammates. It was, perhaps, the greatest point in the history of USC football.

I find stories like that powerful and moving. Jake Olsen's story makes me happy – and I wasn't even there! Happiness happens when we are unselfish enough to help others have their moment. We can do that ourselves, any time of day, any place on earth. We can all serve, help, listen, donate, love. We can all give of our time, our experience, our treasure to help someone else.

So what is Lucado's 'Happiness Challenge'? It's to approach life generously, thinking who we might help, who we might encourage, who we can lift up with a kind word or a listening ear. As we strive to bring help and happiness to others, we might just find that we are happier in the process.

## Our Neighbourhood Plan:

## Thank you

The consultation period for our Neighbourhood Plan concluded in November 2021 and the Neighbourhood Planning Group, on behalf of the Parish Council, would like to say thank you to everyone who took the time to read the proposals and submit responses.

The Neighbourhood Planning Group will publish a full response to all the submissions shortly. For reasons of privacy this response will deal with the questions and issues raised at a summary level. So, for example if there have been three submissions raising concerns about traffic management, there will be one response.

For reference there were 22 responses, 20 from the village, one from WNC and one from Persimmon Homes. From the village there was a total of 50 questions / issues raised.

The Neighbourhood Planning Group and the Parish Council will consider whether amendments need to be made to the Draft Plan, prior to formal submission to the local planning authority, West Northants Council (WNC). Once submitted the planning authority conducts a review of the Draft Plan to ensure it meets specified statutory requirements. Subject to that being satisfactory it is submitted to an independent planning inspector for final review.

Assuming approval by the inspector, the planning authority then organise a simple yes/no referendum for the village; if there's a simple majority vote in favour, the plan then becomes 'made' and is legally enforceable under the Local Development Plan, Part 2.

The benefits of having a 'made' Neighbourhood Plan for our village are significant both in terms of future development and protecting and enhancing our current assets, so we are hugely grateful and appreciative to everyone who continues to be involved in and taking an interest in getting our Neighbourhood Plan in place.

## Astronomy on the Green

#### Happy Lunar new year!

On February 1<sup>st</sup> the new moon heralds the in new year in much of the world, most notably China (Year of the Tiger). As this year is based on Lunar phases January the 2<sup>nd</sup> 2023 will be the next Lunar new year. Our calendar is based on a Solar rather than a Lunar calendar (which can have 12 or 13 months in it). This made me think about how other members of the solar system see their days and years.

**Mercury:** Year length 88 days; Day length 176 days. 36 million miles from the sun. What? How can a day be twice the length a year! Well, Mercury orbits the sun rapidly, but its rotation is locked by solar gravity. So if we imagine a day on Mercury the sun rises in the west, reaches midday, and then reverses direction to set once more in the west. Average temperature range 430°C to -180°C (sun facing vs dark side).

**Venus:** Year length 225 days; Day length 243 days. 67 million miles from the sun. A balmy 480°C (Average). Sun unseen due to thick cloud (advanced greenhouse effect). Venus is one of only two planets that orbits clockwise. Occasional showers of Sulphuric acid rain.

**Earth:** Year length 365.25 days; Day length 24 hours. 93 million miles from sun. Temperature range 47 °C to -81 °C.

**Mars:** Year length 687 days; Day length 24.6 hours. 228 million miles from the sun. A pleasant 20°C to -125°C, very high UV due to thin atmosphere (needs a good suntan lotion).

**Jupiter:** Year length 12 Years; Day length 9 hours 40 minutes. 778 million miles from the sun. Days go fast on Jupiter, but the years drag a bit. This is the first non-rocky planet; it is a Gas Giant (as all below are). Largest Planet: Great Red Spot is a storm that has raged for probably 500 years. Chilly environment -138°C to -230°C.

**Saturn:** Year length 29 Years; Day length 10 hours 42 minutes. 1.44 billion miles from the sun. Great views of the rings; fast rotation of the planet and its Galilean moons. Temperature range -113°C to -173°C.

**Uranus:** Year length 84 Years; Day length 17 hours 14 minutes. 1.78 billion miles from the sun. Tipped on its side at over 90 degrees (probably due to a collision). Faint rings, second planet that orbits clockwise. Temperature range -197°C to -224 °C.

**Neptune:** Year length 165 Years; Day length 16 hours 6 minutes. 2.8 billion miles from the sun; very high wind speeds. Temperature range -113°C to -173°C.

Clear Skies.

#### Allotment News

The weather may not always be to everyone's liking at this time of the year but there really isn't anything quite as good as a few hours brisk work on the allotment on a bright, cold winter morning. Good exercise on the allotment beats the gym hands down and you get something to show for all that effort. You don't get blackbirds and robins singing their hearts out when you are indoors.

Once the year turns round, you can sense that Spring is just around the corner. Snowdrops and primroses are already beginning to appear on some parts of the allotment and I've noticed that those good gardeners who planted broad beans, winter onions and garlic back in the Autumn are seeing the fruit of their labour.

#### Plots are available

We again have several allotments available for rent. These vary in size from small single bed plots to larger allotments for those wishing to grow a wider range of fruit, veg and flowers. We have endeavoured to cover all these with landscape fabric so that weeds do not become rampant and cultivation can be done in stages. All we ask is that you return the landscape fabric when your allotment is fully functioning. #### Using what is on offer

We are very proud of all the work that allotment holders did over the past year helping to keep the allotment site looking good and growing such a rich and varied range of food and flowers.

We know you can buy lots of different fruit and veg from the supermarket, but when you grow your own you know where it has come from; you know it hasn't been dosed in chemicals and you know that you measure your food miles in metres or yards and not in hundreds or thousands of miles.

It was so heartening to see a growing number of people from the village visit the allotments last year and make use of the community space that has been created. Folk who had never ventured to that corner of the village came to have a picnic or just to sit in a beautiful quiet space. We encouraged villagers to come and pick some flowers from the community flower patch (and in return put a can of water on the plants) or take some fruit from the Jam Patch. No one will ever forget the amazing crop of rhubarb we produced last Spring. With any luck our "rhubarb hedge" will be even taller this year (and taste even better).

The community areas are clearly marked so there is no reason to fear you are encroaching on someone's allotment. Please come and join us in 2022.

#### **Rent Night**

Rents for this year have now been levied and a big thank you to all those allotmenteers who have already sent theirs in. This year we have tried to make payment easier by arranging for payment by bank transfer. However, allotmenteers can still pay by cheque or even that strange thing called cash!

Plots were all renumbered last year and remeasured. This had been long overdue and resulted in our discovering some anomalies in rent paid in relation to plot size. Hopefully that has now all been resolved and although several allotmenteers found their rent had increased slightly, the majority discovered a decrease in rents. When all is said and done the cost of renting an allotment in Heyford is remarkably good value.

#### **Community Saturdays**

We held a very successful community morning in November, when a record number of allotment holders and friends of the allotment turned out to carry out a range of routine tasks. We had envisaged this lasting all morning but in just over an hour all the tasks we'd identified were accomplished. It is amazing what can be achieved when a lot of people lend a hand.

We plan to have another Community Saturday on 19<sup>th</sup> March, starting at 10.00.am. If you can join us we would be very grateful. A shed needs painting, tables and chairs need freshening up and there will always be a bit of weeding and planting to do. We might even stretch to some refreshments - and if enough people volunteer we can begin eating by 11.00!

#### **Sharing**

Last year we held a really successful sharing day when we were able to offer to allotment holders – free of charge – a range of allotment equipment and resources that had been given to us. We plan to repeat this in the Spring. If any villagers have tools or garden equipment surplus to requirement do get in touch and we will add it to what we have on offer. Watch this space for further information.

Good Gardening

#### View from the Wildlife Patch

I can't write this article without commenting on the unusually warm weather that we are getting right now and how it is affecting our wildlife. This morning,I could hear Blackbirds and Robins singing in our garden and the surrounding gardens. I was working by the Wildlife Patch last week to the sound of a Great Tit singing. We would not normally expect this till the middle of next month at the earliest. Whether this turns out to be beneficial to our wildlife is really anyone's guess.

Changing the subject, I read a report funded by CPRE that recognises Scrubland as being very valuable habitat. Scrubland is exactly what we are creating in the Wildlife Patch where in some patches we do nothing to the ground. No mowing or trimming, hardly any management at all. We just allow nature to take its course.

On the patch, our scrubland is dominated by Oat Grass and is providing secure habitat for both field and Bank Voles, Wood Mice, and all three of our UK Shrew species, as well as numerous beetles, flies, molluscs and other invertebrates. Having always recognised the value of this habitat it is encouraging to see this value backed up by scientific research.

However, We will not be able to be completely hands off with our management but will be digging brambles out and maybe choosing some large perennial Broad Leaved Plants that will enhance the Scrub. This is due to the fact that our small patch will not really accommodate all the Bush and flower seeds that may drift in over the years.

Another main habitat is our developing Wild Flower Meadow. I experimented at home by sowing Wildflower Meadow Seed on a patch of lawn. We were soon rewarded when a colony of Grass Moths. (Little pointed moths that live in long grass) developed very quickly and surprised how fast Common Field grasshoppers appeared where neither of these species had been before. Another surprise was the amount of Earthworm Casts that have appeared on that patch since I cut the grass in July. There were 4 times the amount of casts than on the surrounding lawn that had been mown regularly as normal lawn maintenance. The lesson we can take from this is how quickly our wildlife will return if we actively create homes for the various species.

On "The Patch" we are well on the way to having created 4 areas of Wildflower Meadow surrounded by Scrubland and interconnected with grassy paths. Of course we also have our Wildlife Pond which had at least one Common Frog hibernating in Autumn 2021. We also had around 4 species of Dragonfly last year as well as some Damselflies.

Rotting timber is another valuable habitat. Our aspiration to scatter piles of this around have been boosted by the acquisition of a good number of native hardwood logs which appeared on the patch. These are now awaiting distribution to their final resting places.

When placed they will provide homes for Fungi, Wood boring Moths and Beetles, Woodlice, Centipedes etc. The amount of life that lives in old dead logs seems endless.

We look forward to another good year in 2022. Hopefully with pleasant surprises.

Today M is off to see Patsy Burke in Jimmies End to get his hair cut. Patsy is more than just a barber. You can get your hair cut, buy your fishing tackle including maggots, 10 fags, and "something for the weekend". Should I worry?

Tomorrow is Sunday so we are going fishing up the cut, probably along Lovers Lane. I'm glad we can now go to a swimming pool with warm water, even if it is an outside pool at Midsummer Meadow.

I passed my shorthand exam at Tech for 110 wpm and have had promotion at work in the Personnel Department working for the Manager so I will no longer be asked to traipse around the factory with new notices. I shall still go on Apprentices outings though.

I had a lift home from work with Roy the other day. His car doors open at the front and I hadn't closed mine properly so I tried to pull it shut and it tugged me outwards. Luckily Roy clung to my coat and pulled me back into the car, probably saving me from a nasty accident. Roy and his mate, Ken, were Teddy Boys, rare in our neck of the woods. The girls thought they were really 'with it' in their drainpipe trousers, long bright coats, boot-lace ties, Brothel Creeper shoes and fancy waistcoats, not to mention their DA hairstyle.

I would like to thank Jill Langrish for the many years she has written fine articles about The Heyford Singers in this magazine and has now finally put down her pen. I would, however, like to make it quite clear that I was 'volunteered' for this task...

The above quote is written at the beginning of Joanna Trollope's The Choir which bears absolutely no resemblance to The Heyford Singers. For a start it is about an exclusive Choir School in a Cathedral where they all have perfect pitch. But it is about saving a Choir. And in our twentieth anniversary year that is precisely what The Heyford Singers are doing for the Community. All types of voices, all types of problems, disabilities and Covid, the Singers produced a concert at Christmas against all odds. And for each and every one of us there was a tremendous amount of satisfaction – perhaps not for the audience (although the response tells us otherwise) – that we had produced a 'rabbit out of a hat'. As you will all know by now that everyone is welcome in our Choir whether you can sing or not. Believe me the Second Sopranos came under that heading (me included) and were put into 'special measures' which meant more practice at Mary Rice's house. Under her eagle eye we all managed to come in on precisely the right note. More or less. You only have to enjoy music and singing in the car or shower. (Why is it loud music and singing makes you drive faster?)

For all those that haven't sung in a choir before you needn't worry (and I certainly hadn't; I was put into the 'growler' section at school as I was too shy to produce a single note in public worried what was going to come out, which turns out to be rather annoying as my music master was Charles Proctor who became a well known concert pianist and conductor). And you don't need to read music. With the tremendous help of our Conductress and Pianist, the choir somehow shapes itself.

For those of you who saw Kate's Concert in Westminster Abbey you would have seen Ellie Goulding sing 'Have Yourselves A Merry Little Christmas' which we sang at our concert. She sang it beautifully but we preferred the original words which appear in the middle 'We'll Muddle Through Somehow' as so many people have done and are still doing just that. Judy Garland sang it originally in Meet Me in St Louis (1944) in which her character comforts her younger sister and the words were written by Ralph Blane and Hugh Martin. Feeling it was a bit too downbeat Frank Sinatra altered the words to 'Hang a Shining Star on the highest Bough' in 2007 and this became the most popular version.

Carols on the Green was a great success as so many of you turned out just before

Christmas. There were about 150 of us singing all the traditional Carols with a closing prayer by The Reverend Stephen Burrow. However if Geoff Allen hadn't been around to help take down the Gazebo it would still be on the Green now. We badly need more men in our Choir, not only to sing but to help out on these occasions. My husband, Keith, had organised this event and being very tired we went to the Fish and Chip shop in Weedon. He only realised how exhausted he was when he went in to order with the tent peg bag over his face.

#### Flood Watch

The UK weather pattern continued to baffle the forecasters with record breaking temperatures of 16 degrees Celsius to end December 2021 whilst the months rainfall reached 140% of an average December. Locally flood alert warnings were issued when the river rose 1m on 26<sup>th</sup>, not due to heavy excessive rainfall but more as a result of saturated ground conditions. Fortunately no flooding resulted. The start of the New Year saw a rapid drop in temperature with overnight levels of -5 degrees and freezing fog, but rainfall has remained low.

The impact of climate change on our weather pattern extremes was highlighted in BBC4 Horizon "What's wrong with our weather". Polar warming, rising temperatures and the reduced temperature difference with the equator caused a reduction in jet stream speed from 300 mph to 100 mph resulting in it meandering. This caused extremes of cold air from the north alternating with warm air from the southern tropics. Meteorologists have discovered that the behaviour of the jet stream in the troposphere(10km high) is also effected by disturbances in the stratosphere (50km high), our ozone layer which provides UV protection. Warming air and rising sea temperatures result in more saturated cloud formations and higher levels of rainfall. These variable climate conditions are difficult to model and are reducing the accuracy of weather forecasting to only a few days ahead.

The lighter evenings are now apparent with daylight hours increasing by 1 hour 20 minutes by the end of January and then continuing to increase by 3.5 minutes per day during February.

A 2 hour meeting was held with the Environment Agency when all issues were debated in an open and frank exchange. All items on the agenda will be investigated and a detailed response is expected in several weeks. In the highest risk areas caused by Heyford Brook the Agency felt the outflow work in Horestone Brooke would reduce the risk but as the study reports emphasised the major problem is the capacity of the E-W culvert for which the only solution is upstream storage. Unfortunately cost is the major issue with the few properties affected giving a poor cost/benefit ratio. Follow up maintenance to the E-W culvert first identified in 2016 needed to be addressed urgently as well as remedial work to the N-S culvert.

The Agency is under pressure to address as a priority properties in areas flooded in December 2021. A strategic study will look at options for storage along the Upper Nene, but it is clear that they see resilience measures for individual properties at risk (self funded) as a possible solution.

An article by James Bevan,head of E/A, entitled "Defusing the Weather Bomb" The Future of Flood Defences highlighted the need for continued build of flood

defences, regular maintenance, upper stream storage using low cost nature based solutions as well as an individual property resilience. All good principals but they need to be addressed in practice.


