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Update from Nether Heyford Parish Council - the annual 'precept'.

Dear Parishioners

As you may be aware the Parish Council raise funds for locally delivered services through something called the 'precept'. This is collected through the Council Tax that you pay to West Northants Council and is noted on your statement as 'parish precept'. The 'precept' is set annually, and the amount proposed for the 2024/25 financial year was approved at the January Parish Council meeting.

The reason for sharing this is that in recent years the 'precept' has been kept at a consistent level, but this has only been achievable through subsidising the precept from reserves, which is not a sustainable approach. This approach has also placed major constraints on the ability to invest in and improve our village. In addition, and in line with clear requirements stated by parishioners through the Neighborhood Planning process, the Parish Council now looks to raise some modest additional funds to address matters such as traffic calming, where funding is simply not available from other sources.

So, what does this mean in terms of an annual increase per household in the parish? On average it equates to an additional \pounds (pound) per week per household. Average approximates to a Band D property. Bands above or below this will pay slightly more or slightly less.

This decision has not been taken lightly, particularly in the context of the cost-of-living challenges for everyone, but by taking this step it places the parish in a position to properly address traffic calming in the village, continue with the rolling programme of upgrading street lighting, replenish reserves, and protect the day-to-day services such as the maintenance of our green spaces. For future years it also opens the opportunity for other projects, such as upgrading the play area.

Funding for such important projects is sadly just not available through our local authority, central government, or other sources so to improve our village we have to look to ourselves to make that investment.

Please do be aware however that certain desired improvements, such as resurfacing our appalling roads, lie outside of the remit of the parish council and we will continue to depend on our local authority to remediate these issues.

The Parish Council's budget and precept setting process is well documented and there are publicly available accounts that are independently audited, so if anyone would like to see any of these details, please do contact the parish clerk. Any questions arising may also be addressed to the parish clerk.

Following the recent precept meeting (meeting to set the budget and spend for the year), the Parish Council wanted to share our plans for the coming year and provide a clear, open and honest view of where we intend to invest in for the coming year.

Over the last few years we have been reluctant to add money to the precept and instead have used the Council's reserves to fund works around the village. This includes items such as starting the upgrade of our street lights, the speed monitor for Furnace Lane among many other items. We have now come to a place where we can no longer allow the reserves to run any lower and have therefore made the difficult decision for the year 2024/25 to add to our precept to allow us to continue to make investments into the village for the good of the village and it's residents. These investments/upgrades are taken from the Neighbourhood Plan along with listening to residents within our village.

This will mean that the precept will increase and as such there will be a small increase to each households Council Tax. Please understand that this is not something we have taken lightly, but we have recognized that we still need to make significant changes/improvements around the village, by not taking this action, we will leave ourselves in a position where services could end up suffering or disappearing altogether.

For the coming year, we have agreed with WNC to fund share the costs of traffic calming measures in Furnace Lane, which we know is a major concern to a lot of our residents, along with continuing to invest in the upgrading of our lighting system. We have also engaged new contractors to look after our green spaces, as again we have listened to the village and recognized that the current state of these was not acceptable to any of us.

We hope that people will understand our decisions based on the information above.

The January 8th Parish Council Meeting was held in the Baptist Church Rooms.

NEIL HAYNES

A minute's silence was held in respect of former Councillor and Parish Council Chairman Neil Haynes, (who died on Jan 5th), at the start of the meeting. Neil had been chair on several occasions, and had served as a Councillor for 40 years, only resigning due to poor health. Neil had always been heavily involved in village life, and will be very much missed.

Gravel Extraction WNC.22.00035.MINFUL. No further information.

Concerns about landfill at the top of Furnace Lane had been expressed to Planning – but the response had been that this was in line with the permission granted. TW had then expressed concern about the nature of the material used (given that watercourse was involved) – but the planning dept had suggested he monitor this. TW felt that this was the duty of the planning authority.

Reports.

Green. AW reported that there had been a meeting of the wildlife association in December and expressed concerns about flooding, which has made a return, but was felt not to be as bad as in the past.

The PCC has been contacted regarding conservation measures for the churchyard.

AW reported the intention to plant 4 additional trees. 2 on the triangle between Bugbrooke Rd and Watery Lane; and 2 on the West end of the green to replace lost trees.

LE reported that Allotments rent night would be held on Jan 23rd. and anticipated full take up of plots.

Wellbeing. KWD reported that a meeting had taken place with Rachel Burn from WNC; a very enthusiastic officer. Information was exchanged. RB will send data on Heyford which KWD feels will be useful. The question of isolation in rural areas is high on the agenda. There are concerns that the Community Lounge is not listed as a welcoming space.

Resolved. KWD to approach Bugbrooke Practice Patient Group with a view to representing Council.

Infrastructure

IP reported poor access to the canal from Furnace Lane, and that the Canal and River Trust were unwilling to do anything. He also expressed concern about parking practices on Furnace Lane. 4 drivers had been caught speeding by the PCSO. IP reported having to charge SID battery every 5 days as the solar charging appears not work in current conditions. Manufacturers to be approached.

The Council has asked to be included in the list for match funding for a chicane.

Lighting

AW had calculated Council has 112 lights, 39 of which are now LEDS, which should already have reduced energy consumption by 20%. Lighting priorities should be.

- 1) Remove Fibreglass columns on Hillside Cresc.
- 2) To replace failing lights with LEDs (apart from Bliss Close). Situation to be monitored at half year, & adjusted to circumstances.

Councillors were asked to consider a policy with 2 main points. 1) Rolling refurbishment dependent on finance. 2) Lights to be switched off between midnight and 05.00. This was felt to be a good thing for biodiversity and wildlife.

Heritage

Some residents had expressed a desire to help out. TW wondered whether the Olde Sun pub could be registered as a community asset.

Community

CK aware of isolation issues through delivering prescriptions for Bugbrooke Surgery.

Restoration of, and siting of, vintage Rocking Horse in Play Area.

A vintage rocking horse, (formerly in the Play Area) had been retrieved from the grounds of the "Olde Sun". This would be restored by volunteers. When restored Council would check that it would be safe for re-installation on the Green as a static (i.e. non – rocking) feature.

To consider what the council can do to conserve and enhance biodiversity in the area. NCALC Directive.

DM responded that Council already had a biodiversity policy.

To set a Precept for 2024 -25. Resolved. To set a precept of £139,477.

Reporting Highway and Footpath Issues

The Clerk will report issues that Council is made aware of, but Council would encourage residents to use the Fixmystreet service to report issues themselves as there will then be no time lag; and first-hand reports are almost always better than 2nd or 3rd hand reports. During February we shall be praying for people living in Hillside Rd and Hillside Crescent here in Heyford, Sutton St, Yew Tree Gardens and Sutton Acre in Flore, The Manor in Church Stowe and the Gate House and the Old Dairy in Brockhall.

Dear Friends,

In the month of February, we move quickly through the seasons of the Church. We begin in the last few days of Epiphany, celebrating Candlemas and the presentation of Jesus in the temple. Then, from the highs of Christmas and Epiphany, we have a couple of Sundays of what the Church calls ordinary time, before we enter the season of Lent. These days, Christians observe Lent in different ways. It can be a time for reflection and meditation, self-examination and penitence, abstinence and acts of charity, as we make our way to the foot of the cross and celebrate Holy Week and Easter at the end of March. Traditionally Lent begins with the wearing of ashes on Ash Wednesday, followed by forty fast days and six Sundays. The forty days remind us of the forty days spent by Jesus in the wilderness, being tested by the devil.

As we journey through the Church calendar, we also travel through the seasons of the natural world, as Winter moves into Spring. The seeds and bulbs which have lain dormant beneath the cold, hard earth of winter will sprout into new life with the warmer temperatures and the spring rains. As shoots make their way through the soil, and flowers blossom and grow, we again see God at work in the beauty and diversity of the created world, and we see the promise of resurrection re-enacted in the local environment.

The environment will be the subject of our Lent Course this year. We'll be thinking about our food, and how it impacts on different aspects of our life and our world. Please see the 'advert' below for more details.

I pray that as we move through February, we will be alert to the wonders and miracles of God at work in the changing seasons.

Heyford Garden Club

We live in a beautiful village full of many well-kept gardens and thriving allotments. Quite clearly the people of Heyford know how to grow things and are rightly proud of their achievements.

What a pity then that Heyford Garden Club has had difficulty getting people through the doors at its monthly meetings. Oddly, membership is still buoyant and there are around fifty people who signed up and paid their annual subscription last January.

Growing stuff isn't just for "oldies", look at the new faces on TV's Gardeners World and Beechgrove. It's the new cool. The age profile of allotmenteers has dropped dramatically, and good thing too.

The quality of the speakers invited to join the garden club last year was generally very good and the range of activities offered were varied. The ever-popular plant tombola at the Village Hall Fete was a great success and lots of people again visited the stall. The club took almost £400 in sales.

The hard-working people who run the club need your help. Costs have spiralled over the past two years and where once the club could obtain the services of a speaker for under £100, that is now closer to £200, often plus expenses! Add on to that the cost of hiring the village hall and you can see that fifteen or twenty people through the door on a club night does not make financial sense.

If we want a garden club in Heyford, a club that reflects the passion that so many people in the village seem to put into their gardening and allotmenting, then it has to be supported by more people. The committee are very keen to reflect the views of the community and to tailor the things that can be offered to what that community would like to see from their local garden club.

We know that many village organisations have struggled with membership since Covid and that many old stalwarts of these village clubs would like (or have already taken) the opportunity to step back in favour of some new and perhaps, younger blood. Without this constant sort of "refreshment" we could be left with very few village organisations and what a tragedy that would be for our special corner of the country! There is much truth in the old adage "use it or lose it".

Heyford Garden Club will be holding it's Annual General Meeting at 7.30.p.m. in the Village Youth Club on Ridgeway Furlong on Monday 25th March. This change of venue has come about because the village hall, the usual place the club meets, is unavailable on that night.

AGM's have a reputation for being a bit tedious. We can guarantee this will not be like that as there is a lot at stake and your support – members past, present and prospective newbies is important. Your views will be highly valued. Let's see this as a new way forward.

Astronomy on the Green



Heyford Allotments

Rents

By the time readers of the Prattler receive this month's copy of our excellent village magazine, Heyford Allotments will have held its annual Rent Night. As we have commented on a number of occasions, the rent for an allotment plot in Heyford is remarkably good value. From recent communications and online posts this would not appear to be the case across the whole country. Some councils charge as much as £250 for a 25 square metre plot, plus an additional sum for water! The picture across the UK is really varied so we, in Heyford, should be very grateful for what we have and treasure it dearly.

As if high rents were not enough, the waiting lists for allotments in some areas is staggering. Nottingham City Council apparently has the longest waiting list in the country and as of 2021, 6,845 citizens of that city were still waiting for their little patch of green! Fortunately, we only have two or three people on our list and no one has to wait much longer than a few months. Spare a thought for the would-be allotmenteers of Camden in North London who have the dubious record of the longest wait in recent times; 18 years and three months.

Allotment rents in Heyford are based on a charge of 20p per square metre. This meets the cost of the annual hedge cutting, the fuel and maintenance for mowers, strimmers and other machinery and incidentals such as posts and wire for fruit trees as well as the occasional roll of landscape fabric. Without the volunteers who keep the paths and community areas in good order and carry out basic maintenance tasks, these costs would be considerably greater. It is unlikely the Parish Council could (or should) pay for this amount of labour. To even contemplate that would mean drastically increasing rents or simply letting the allotments deteriorate into the state they were five or six years ago.

I hope readers can now see why it is so important we enlist as much help as possible on our two "community mornings", held in March and October. Your support is vital and so welcome – you don't even have to be an allotment holder to give up an hour or two twice a year.

We are hopeful that all tenants will have paid their rent on time, or if they no longer feel able to look after their plot, they let us know. That way we can accommodate new tenants quickly and before the growing season begins.

A big thank you to those good folk who have already contacted us to let us know they are giving up their allotment this year. That is much appreciated and helps us plan for the future.

Good for You (and your pocket)

We've often written about the health benefits of having an allotment and how it acts as a "green gym". It is now an accepted fact that the NHS sees having an allotment as a form of social prescribing.

In 2018 the UK Government produced a 25 Year Environment Plan, which acknowledges that connecting people to their environment will improve their health and well-being. A study in the Netherlands showed that every 10 per cent increase in exposure to green space translated into an improvement in health, equivalent to being five years younger, with similar benefits found by studies in Canada and Japan.

The National Allotment Society estimates that if, over the course of one year, you spent £247 cultivating a 25m x 10m plot you could produce around £2,000 of food. Like many of our fellow allotmenteers we don't spend anything like that sort of money, yet I can guarantee that we get that sort of return ... from a much smaller plot.

And I haven't even begun to discuss the health benefits of knowing what you've grown has not been subjected to all sorts of chemical sprays. That's a topic for another time.

If nothing else, allotmenteers are remarkably good at making good use of materials that might otherwise be thrown away and of propagating and sharing plants and seedlings. These are the things that bring down costs dramatically and often give allotments their unique appearance.

Flood Watch

Rain,rain and more rain was the daily pattern for December with the months total rainfall at 250% of normal whilst the years total was 137% of normal. The month ended with gale force winds from storm Gerrit and the highest recorded river levels since 2020 causing local flooding. No sooner had the flood waters receded when storm Henk struck resulting in more severe flooding both locally and across the Country. Over 2000 homes were flooded with Billing Aquadrome again being a victim on the low land to the east of Northampton. This ended the longest flood free period recorded locally,namely 3 years. In spite of road closure and flood signs motorists continued to ignore the risk of driving through flood waters.

The impact of flooding on such a scale caused the Government to question the performance of the Environment Agency. The Agency CEO Phillip Duffy insisted the Agency funding was at an all time high which belies the announced cuts in funding by 40% and cuts to new flood defences with reduction of personnel. This results in a reduction in the number of homes the Agency planned to protect from 336,000 to 200,000 by 2027. With climate change more than 6 million homes are at risk of flooding. At the same time building on the floodplain continues which MPs described as unforgivable..

Robust flood resilience must be a priority whilst smaller projects at rural levels should be given the same rights to protection as others. The number of properties at risk of flooding because of deteriorating defences eclipsed those benefiting from new defences. This is enigmatic of the Agency and Government failure to strike the right balance between maintenance and construction.

Although the weather has been drier following the recent series of storms the forecast remains unsettled with continuing freezing conditions and the potential risk from storm Isha caused by increasing speed of the jet stream resulting from extreme Arctic conditions in the USA.

The weather is now so unpredictable that the current freezing conditions may change to rising temperatures into the mid teens. In passing December recorded the highest temperature in 20 years of 15.5 degrees.

The later sunset times are already apparent increasing one hour by the end of January and a further one hour by the end of February to 17.42 hours.

Finally the Environment Agency has been accused of signing off pollution records from the Water Companies without investigating the circumstances in 90% of spillage cases. Clearly funding and manpower issues are having a noticeable impact. Let us hope that the recent flooding events are not forgotten as has historically been the case and that the Government takes action.

View from the Wildlife Patch

On this first month of 2024 I find myself looking forward to the New Year with some trepidation. If Global Climate Change is affecting the lives of us human beings in the way of severe flooding, intense heat, severe gales, rising tides and more. The effect on our wildlife is much greater. Our plants and animals have spent thousands of years evolving and adapting to thrive with a relatively stable weather pattern, these changes must be putting enormous stress. Just to survive and maintain many species can only be getting more difficult year on year.

Where I live, at the top of Rolfe Crescent, some of our hedgehogs have not gone into hibernation this year. We are still feeding calcy worms and at least one hedgehog is feeding on them every night. Even when the temperature fell to -4 -6C we saw a hedgehog feeding there, I'll put out a "Trail Cam" to see just how many hedgehogs are still active. Hedgehogs feed mainly on Insects and molluscs. Both of these groups have been in steep decline in recent years. It could be there were not enough of these for hedgehogs to put on the amount of fat needed to keep them going over the winter. The Hedgehog species is now in steep decline. Many environmentalists predict that if this decline continues we will be looking at a near UK Hedgehog extinction, not too many years from now.

Most Heyford residents will have seen the majestic Red Kites that have appeared over our gardens in recent years. There is a common belief these birds are mainly scavengers. Whilst is true they will take food from BBQs etc, in the main Red Kites are predators who will take large birds. The RSPB bird book says they will take birds up to the size of gulls. I have watched a kite hunting Carrion Crows by Mantles Heath Wood. A study in Wales found 25% of their diet consisted of Magpies and less than 2% came from food scavenged from humans. You may remember a TV "Spring Watch" programme which watched a pair of Kites bringing young jackdaws to feed their nestlings

You may also have noticed that there seem to be less Kites and Buzzards in our skies than there were 2 years ago. I have read that in some coastal regions, predatory and scavenging birds have been found to be vulnerable to Bird Flu as their feeding habits depend on them taking out the weaker birds. In this case it would be the aquatic life that prefers shallow water. Experience has shown that our shallow water prey are affected by Bird flu making predators and scavengers more at risk than other species. Could this be a factor in our area?

On the patch, our pond is still full of water proving that repairs to the membrane are a success. The pond is designed to have large shallow area as a lot of aquatic life lives in shallow water. However shallow water heats rapidly in sunny weather leading to rapid excessive evaporation. The volumes of water needed in constantly refilling needed to maintain the level is not acceptable in modern society. The HWA is now considering options to remedy this situation.

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
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
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
