The February 8th Parish Council Meeting was held in the Baptist Church Rooms.

Planning Issues

TW reported that WNC was getting close to dealing with its backlog of planning decisions. WNC had previously accepted that things were not going well. New permanent staff had been taken on and were nearing the end of their training/induction period.

Gravel extraction. WNC.22. 00035.MINFUL. No further information.

Concerns about landfill at the top of Furnace Lane continue to be expressed to Planning.

Community Lounge (CL)

The initiation of a programme of events in the afternoons had caused the attendance to increase. It had been planned to continue with the CL until March/April - depending on the weather, and then close until October. However, there is now debate as to whether the project could be kept going through Spring/Summer if it just opened on Wednesday afternoons during that period. This could be practical if sufficient volunteers could be found. There is a national movement towards Welcoming Spaces which is endorsed by WNC, and some funding possibly available. Such projects are felt to help with isolation, especially in rural and semi – rural areas.

West Northants Councillor Report

Cllr Adam Brown reported that the draft budget would go to cabinet next week with 95 pages of public consultation. Higher fines for fly tipping would be introduced, as would measures against the sale of vapes to minors. There would be a new special needs school at Tiffield and a new night shelter in Northampton. WNC are adjusting their estate to save money, which includes moving Northampton Town council from the Guildhall to Angel Square.

Public Participation

It was asked whether the SID (Speed indicating device) could be used on Weedon or Bugbrooke Rd. A license was necessary to move the SID and had been applied for.

Reports

Green

A map showing the new trees had been produced. Clerk to print and laminate. AW would ask for ideas on further planting. Work had been done on the wildlife area at the allotments, and DM felt that wildlife "patches" could be introduced to parts of the Green and in the Churchyard. DM reported that one of the Holly trees planted on Hillside Rd had been "barked."

Concern was expressed about the state of tall trees at the pumping station on Furnace Lane, which is the responsibility of Anglian Water. One had already fallen during a recent storm.

Wellbeing

KWD had distributed a definition of wellbeing; and had applied to Bugbrooke surgery to join the Patient Participation Group. She had received and distributed figures and data regarding wellbeing from WNC. It seems that the population is generally healthier, but older than the national average. KWD would seek to gather information anecdotally to add to a picture of the village.

Regarding the Community Lounge it was felt that having a programme of events was positive, and that the project had potential for helping with isolation. It was also felt that other events could be held there, and that signs were needed.

Infrastructure

IP was reassured that the downloaded SID data was of interest. The highest speeds recorded were 60mph coming in, and 64mph going out.

The canal trust had no money to spend on the towpath; and IP wondered if Council were prepared to pay for improvements to it. It was not felt that this was desirable.

DNH to be instructed to install a dog waste bin at the previous site. Resolved. To replace the Furnace Lane dog bin with a larger model.

TW asked about match funding for a chicane in Furnace Lane. Clerk to follow up. Cllr AB would also follow up.

It had been learned that 2Commune sites would be taken over by Cuttlefish and no action was necessary until the renewal date. LH had been in touch with Hugo Fox – and would look into their offers, so that a decision could be made by the renewal date.

Parish Council meetings in 2024 will normally be on the first Monday of each month, (unless a Bank Holiday) and would start at 19.30. The next ones are on Monday March 6th & April 8th.

Reporting Highway and Footpath Issues. The Clerk will report issues that Council is made aware of, but Council would encourage residents to use the Fixmystreet service to report issues themselves as there will then be no time lag; and first-hand reports are almost always better than 2nd or 3rd hand reports. Dear Friends,

"...a voice came from heaven: 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.' At once the Spirit sent Jesus out into the wilderness, and he was in the wilderness for forty days, being tempted by Satan. He was with the wild animals, and angels attended him."

(Mark 1:11-13)

'Hello. Who are you?' I wonder how you answer such a question. What about related questions; 'Where do you come from?', 'What do you do?'. Your answer may depend on who's asking, and in what context. But our answers to such questions don't define us; we are much more than what we do, or where we come from.

So, who are you? What makes you the wonderful and unique person that you are? And do you realise how special you are?

In the first chapter of St Mark's Gospel, we find Jesus wrestling with his identity. Baptised by John in the River Jordan, Jesus hears God's words of love and affirmation as he rises up out of the water; 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.' Mark tells us that the Holy Spirit immediately sent Jesus out into the wilderness. There he spent forty days and forty nights, exploring what it might mean to be the Son of God. Unlike Matthew and Luke, Mark makes no mention of the three temptations Jesus faced at the end of those forty days. Instead, he simply tells us that Jesus was tempted during his time in the wilderness, where angels also attended him, which is another way of saying that God was with him.

I believe that God loves every one of us the way he loves Jesus. We are all much-loved and valued daughters and sons of God. Whoever we are. Wherever we come from. Whatever we've done. Whatever challenges we might face in life, whatever wildernesses we might travel through, God loves us, and God is with us.

I pray that as we make our way through Lent this month, we will all find time and space to explore what it means to be a much-loved child of God.

Sunday 17th February marks a significant day for the Nether Heyford Branch, Royal British Legion and the Nether Heyford Women's Section, Royal British Legion. As, during the Holy Communion Service at The Parish Church of St. Peter & St. Paul, Rev. Stephen laid up the Women's Section standard and dedicated the Nether Heyford Branch standard.

What does this actually mean??

To continue to have a Royal British Legion presence in Nether Heyford, due to lowering membership numbers, the Women's section had to become a 'main branch'. With the formation of the main branch, a new standard (the flag that is carried during official parades and ceremonies) had to be purchased and as reported last month in The Prattler, this would not have been possible without the very generous donations and fundraising events within the village. To enable the new standard to be paraded by the Branch Standard Bearer, Charles Kiloh, it must be officially dedicated.

As the Women's Section has now become a main branch, the Women's Section standard had to be retired (laid up). The Standard was handed over to Rev. Stephen by Kath Pancoust to be laid up and remain in the church.

Astronomy on the Green

Star gazing is a hobby enjoyed by many; one does not have to be an astronomer to enjoy a dark sky full of twinkling stars. Unfortunately, in our crowded Isle this is possible for fewer and fewer people. The CPRE has been running star counts over recent years and the results for 2023 are now in. Only 5% of us enjoy truly dark skies, and 75% of us suffer from obscured views of the night sky.

I have taken part in the star counts (based on the number of stars visible in the main body of the constellation Orion) during February. This year the CPRE have ceased the star count to free up resources for an education campaign. My count of stars has taken part in the centre of the Green; the last few years were 2021, 23; 2022, 21, 2023, 19.

Emma Marrington, CPRE's landscape enhancement lead, said: 'It's great that so many people took part in Star Count this year (2023). What is clear is that light pollution continues to affect people's experience of the night sky. Action is needed now!

Local councils need a strong approach to manage light pollution. They should ensure local planning and street lighting policies protect dark skies and intrinsically dark landscapes in their areas. We're also calling for the introduction of minimum standards nationally, to manage external lighting and help cut light pollution.'

'This would be a hugely important step towards strengthened planning to ensure we get well-designed lighting that is only used when and where it is needed. This would protect our existing dark skies for the benefit of current and future generations.'

It is a little inconvenient that the new lighting by the Baptist Chapel and the Village Hall, while illuminating the roadway and paths well also illuminates halfway across the main part of the Green. Effectively, this prevents any meaningful star watching except between midnight and five am.

I have raised the issue of shielding the lamps (with the Parish Council) to prevent the light pollution, but apparently nothing can be done, such is life.

Clear, dark skies all!

'My triumph is attained From now I can speak from the heart'

Beethoven's response to the audience approval after his Ninth Symphony which incorporates the now famous 'Ode to Joy'

Two hundred years ago The Ninth Symphony was performed with a huge breach of tradition – it was on a Friday in 1824 when the ruling classes went to their country houses for the weekend and it was thought no-one would attend. But Beethoven cut the ticket prices and broke dress code, wearing a green jacket because he did not own a black frock coat and thus opened the doors to the ordinary section of the community; the real people, not just the elite. 'The audience was entranced – some aristocrats stayed in town; one old count was stretchered in from his deathbed and seatless students clung to the side rails. The tension cranked up over 50 minutes. Six minutes into the finale a bass singer declared "Friends, not these notes – let's try something nicer, more cheerful" The orchestra gave him one bar to catch his breath before the bass bellowed out "freude!" or "joy". The chorus rose, invoking revolution with the words "all people will be brothers." And now Beethoven had given crowd power to Friedrich Schiller's Ode to Joy of 1785. Schiller's poem had been wishful, utopian; Beethoven made it seem practical, inevitable.' (*Taken from The Sunday Times Culture section on An Ode to Joy*).

And so choirs in (most) countries all over the world now have the freedom to express themselves in song. Which is what The Heyford Singers do every week on a Thursday or Friday. Apparently Tom Jones at 82 can still hit a top 'A' having a perfect operatic Tenor voice. Well some of our sopranos can do just that when exercising their voices, but fortunately most of our music requires only a top 'G'. (The first note above the stave). One such song is 'I Hear Music in Me' by David Sprunger which is a beautiful melody with its second line of lyrics 'And I cannot be silent'. And to add to the variety we are rehearsing 'And All That Jazz' from the musical Chicago. We were all a little confused by the Soprano line 'I'm gonna rouge my knees and roll my stockings down' but it turns out in the twenties, flapper girls would apply blush to their knee caps to draw attention to this part of the body (which was frowned upon to reveal at the time!) Then they rolled their stockings down to draw focus to the exposed leg above. Times change don't they?...

We were congratulating ourselves on the numbers attending Choir rehearsals – when our wonderful pianist, Graham Kinnersly fell and broke his arm. We are fortunate in having an excellent stand-in pianist (a Chorister and a Church Organist) who is adapting well to our strange ways. And as Alan is on his second week with us, we can't be that bad to accompany.... We all miss Graham and wish him a very speedy recovery.

The John Rutter books are one of our favourites, as they are easy to sight read. Not so easy to put in the feeling that the Rutter lyrics demand. 'Look at the world' is

a beautiful anthem and was written in celebration of the 70th anniversary of the Council for the Protection of Rural England set up in 1926. 'Look at the world and marvel every day; so many joys and wonders, so many miracles along our way'. One of the many songs we will be singing at our Concert in May and by then we will have mastered the 'light and shade' required in this lovely piece. And in contrast there is 'The Best of Bond' consisting of a number of the opening songs you will be familiar with. The timing in these is very difficult and we don't have Shirley Bassey (Goldfinger), Nancy Sinatra (You only Live Twice) nor Paul McCartney and Wings (Live and Let Die). But what we do have is the ability to sing in four part harmony and plenty of enthusiasm. Getting out on a wet, winter evening is not the easiest thing to do but when we sit in the Village Hall, open our music books and start to sing, a transformation happens because for those two hours you think of nothing except following the music and trying to make a decent sound.

Flood Watch

Its official! 1.5 degrees centigrade has been exceeded as climate change continues to create irregular weather patterns. The jet stream continues to bring storm conditions whilst warm air is drawn up from Europe. As a result we have reached letter J (Joselyn), number 10 in the storm names for 2023-2024 with the next storm Kathleen equalling the all time record for one season. Unfortunately warm air in winter means rain bearing clouds resulting in three local flooding events already in 2024. This follows three years without any flooding events. February temperatures of 17 degrees centigrade has created a new record for a winter month. The forecast for the remainder of February is a return to normal temperatures in single figures with reducing rainfall.

February has been exceptionally wet with over 90 mm recorded in 3 weeks, 200% of normal. This compares with 9mm in 2023 which was an exceptionally dry month. As we approach March, daylight hours continue to lengthen by 3 to 4 minutes per day. The 20th of March will mark the end of winter and with the clock going forward by 1 hour on 31st March, sunset will be at 19.37 and daylight hours will increase to 13 hours.

During the recent flooding events I inspected the status of Heyford Brooke where it enters the E-W culvert only to find large logs up to 12" in diameter, plastic bottles and a plastic bucket. Unfortunately the force of the water allowed material to enter the culvert. Torrents of water laden with such material will enhance damage to a culvert already suffering from lack of maintenance and will eventually block the outflow into Horestone Brooke.

It is vital to ensure such debris is not allowed to enter the Brooke by ensuring the banks upstream of the culvert are kept free of any form of debris at least up to flood levels. Remember the E-W culvert forms the only protection to the Village centre which has suffered in the past.

View from the Wildlife Patch

2024 is proving to be a remarkable year. I write this in the middle of February that is forecast to be the warmest since records began. Blackthorn is in flower, Bees and Butterflies are on the wing and we have had frogs "croaking" in Pauline's garden ponds for several nights.

There are now several species of frog in the UK. However, all wild frogs in Heyford are likely to be British Common Frogs (Rana temporiara). Males of this species are always the first to arrive. They announce their arrival with short "croaks". This croaking advertises their presence to other frogs Male and Female alike. After croaking thus for a few days, they then shift to a sort of synchronised croaking - almost a loud purr. This "purring" stops and starts, rises and falls, throughout the night hours and is occasionally heard during daylight hours throughout the whole spawning period. Our garden Frogs started "purring" last night and will continue for a two or three weeks.

I know that many readers have their own garden ponds and will be enjoying their own frogs. If this is you, your own frogs purring and spawning could well be over by the time you read this. The resulting tadpoles will provide food for Newts, Dragonfly and Damselfly Nymphs, as well as Water Beetle adults and larvae. And more. These Tadpoles develop to become froglets which leave the water in their hundreds to provide food for birds, hedgehogs and many insects. Scientists who measure these things have discovered less than 5% of these will go on to reach their second year.

I was watching for frogs in the wildlife patch pond recently. Sadly there does not seem to be any frog activity there yet. However this may have changed by the time you read this.

Regular readers will remember this pond liner mysteriously developed a horizontal cut. This is now repaired and the pond is holding water as planned. We have great hopes of amphibians breeding in the pond again now the pond is serviceable.

Readers with cats may have discovered that Frogs do have an "alarm call". When we had cats they would often bring frogs into our kitchen. Often such frogs were in what can only be described as a "flat, disc shaped, rigid paralysis". When these "discs" were touched, they would utter a sort of "screech" and suddenly "jerk". Those who have seen this will agree. This is VERY startling and unfroglike.

On to the rest of the Wildlife Patch. The Wildflower Meadow areas have now been mown to 3 inches. This will let the light in to allow the broad leaved plants to grow. This would usually be a job for March but we seem to be 3 weeks earlier this year so it has been mown accordingly. Hopefully the flowers will look even better than they did in Summer 2023.

We expect to be scattering a few pieces of slate etc. around the patch when I can obtain some. These will provide shelter for various invertebrates (Woodlice, Centipedes, Molluscs etc.) providing a mature, wildlife rich habitat. We already have woodpiles, Nettle-beds etc. but the advantage of these "flat habitats" is they can easily be lifted to view the life underneath without unduly damaging the habitat. Like us these creatures like to live in peace without inquisitive folk smashing up their houses.


