We will meet again at the AGM on 27th January 2025 at 7.30 pm.

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
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The October meeting took place on the 7th October at the Baptist Church Rooms

Housing Needs survey report from Samantha Bosworth from WNC.

A Housing Needs Survey had been carried out during the preparation for the Neighbourhood Plan. However, the new government wishes to build more housing (especially affordable housing) and has made money available for new surveys. Ms Bosworth works with communities to try and find suitable locations for small developments i.e. 8 – 10 houses. A questionnaire is nearly ready, and Councillors expressed willingness to distribute it. It was also agreed to put all responses into a prize draw, as an incentive. The survey could be filled in online or on paper. It was hoped to get it done before Christmas.

West Northants Councillor report.

Cllr Phil Bignell reported that a new crematorium was proposed for the district reflecting the increased population. The WNC draft tree strategy is close to completion.

Public Participation.

A resident complained that many of the village pavements were in poor condition for wheelchair users, especially near the school where the situation was exacerbated by vehicles parked partially or wholly on the pavement. Councillors would check pavements which could be reported on Fix my Street or to Highways. The PCSO would also report on his behalf. He had also been told by another resident that he could not take a powered wheelchair on to the Green. He was assured that this was not the case.

Another resident complained that the footpath from Watery Lane towards Bugbrooke was badly affected by brambles. She asked that these be entirely removed to unblock the proper course of the footpath and that all debris be removed to avoid dogs treading on the barbs. Footpaths should be reported on Fix my Street. Quotes would be sought for possible removal.

To decide on whether to maintain the agreement with Bugbrooke PC regarding the PCSO.

Clerk had contacted Bugbrooke PC. Cllr PB reported that Bugbrooke should be continuing with the present arrangement, and would contact the clerk when this was confirmed.

Resolved. To continue with the arrangement if Bugbrooke maintained the same arrangement.

SID post on Weedon Rd - Clerk reported that householders at 22 and 24 Weedon Rd had been contacted and no objections had been voiced to siting the post between them. However, IP felt that there should be a solar powered option on this post which would require a 3.5m tall post. This would mean that he would not have to regularly change batteries. Clerk to contact Highways and request this. Clerk cautioned that there would certainly be an additional charge for this change. NC felt that the Furnace Lane site would become irrelevant after the installation of a chicane. A quote for £3746 had been received for an additional data receiving SID.

Mosaic - There had been no response to the appeal for opinions as to where to site the Mosaic.

Resolved. Mosaic to be sited on the Green opposite the school and across Coronation Way from the sign there.

Election May 2025 - NCALC is keen that all Councils do their best to publicise the 2025 election. Clerk and councillors to consider what could usefully be done to achieve a contested election.

Light Column on Winston Close - Clerk had contacted Mick George Ltd regarding the incident; they had been made aware by the driver. Clerk to forward quote for restoring the column.

Reports

Environment - The question as to whether additional dog bins were required was posed. Clerk to enquire as to the feasibility of putting two additional bins on the same posts as existing bins on the Green. If this is unfeasible, to ask for quote for 2 additional single bins.

5 trees were proposed. 2 on Hillside Rd to replace lost trees. One near the bus stop on Hillside Rd, one to replace a damaged sapling on the green and one on Furnace Lane to replace a recently lost tree. The latter would be a memorial to Bob Smith.

Infrastructure - Resolved. Lights identified in Rolfe Crescent and Close Rd, Pole no 20 in Church St, were to be replaced with LEDS. Light no 5 in Bliss Close needed lamp changing. Light at Junction with Winston Close to be moved. As the clerk had had no success so far in securing a rebate from YU for the changes from sodium to LED lighting Councillors recommended approaching the Ombudsman.

Heritage - TW reported that work on a heritage leaflet was ongoing. The purchase of archiving software was being considered.

Community - NC and LD had visited the play area. NC had produced a spreadsheet for volunteers to use in inspections of the site.

Charles Kiloh had volunteered to keep monitoring the defibrillators, and to remain a member of the Joint Burial Board. Councillors thanked Charles.

LE reported that Anglian Water would be repairing the gate shortly. She reported that 2 more gates and posts needed to be replaced. Quotes to be sought.

A quote for approx. £90 p/m to mow the allotment paths had been received. Further quotes to be sought. It was felt that Allotment rents would need to be raised.

Community Lounge (CL) - The Lounge will be open from 10.30 to 4.30pm each Wednesday from Nov 6th until the end of March. The Lounge is now part of the National Chatty Café network aimed at combatting isolation and loneliness and promoting wellbeing. The volunteers are debating what sort of afternoon programme there should be. Suggestions are welcomed.

The CL is dependent on volunteers to keep it running, and many thanks to Lynda and Karen for all their efforts. If you do have a free afternoon, you are always welcome as a visitor or a helper.

Parish Council meetings in 2024/25 will normally be on the first Monday of each month, (unless a Bank Holiday) and would start at 19.30.

Reporting Canal Issues can be done by phoning 0303 040 4040 during normal office hours.

Reporting Highway and Footpath Issues. The Clerk will report issues that Council is made aware of, but Council would encourage residents to use the Fixmystreet service to report issues themselves as there will then be no time lag; and first-hand reports are almost always better than 2nd or 3rd hand reports. Streetlights within the village can be reported to the Clerk, who will report them to the maintenance company. Please do not report to Balfour Beatty as they deal only with major Highway lights – i.e., motorway, A5 and A45.

Dear Friends,

We now enter the season of Advent, a season of expectation and preparation, as we get ready to celebrate Jesus' birth, and look ahead to his final return as judge at the end of time. Traditionally during Advent, the Church has looked at the four 'last things', Death, Judgement, Heaven, and Hell. More recently, it has generally moved away from such themes to think of hope, peace, joy and love. But whatever our focus, Advent is a time of waiting.

Advent begins in the dark. We might do all we can to fend off the dark, switching on our Christmas lights at the end of November perhaps, or festooning our homes with sparkling tinsel and baubles. Regardless, Advent begins in the dark. It is a season of reflecting on the reality of the world and waiting with expectation for something better – which for Christians means celebrating Jesus' birth and anticipating his triumphant return in glory. Yet, in reflecting on the reality of the world, we are going to confront serious darkness. We don't have to look far to see it, war, poverty, abuse and exploitation. Sadly, it seems as though darkness is often the reality in which we live.

In Advent, the Church journeys from darkness to light. We consider the world around us; we look back to Jesus' birth as a baby – and we find ourselves longing for Jesus, the 'light of the world' to step in again. We wait with confidence, knowing that Jesus will show up, for 'the people walking in darkness have seen a great light' (Isaiah 9:2) and that 'light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it' (John 1:5)

Advent is about waiting. Advent begins in the dark. It points us towards something greater, and acknowledges that faced with darkness, we long for light, for hope, for peace and for joy. Advent promises that greater thing is on its way.


I pray you have a Blessed Christmas, and I hope you will be able to join us at our services.

Astronomy on the Green

The Outer limits – this month a quick overview of the solar systems giants, namely the Gas giants and Ice giants.

Let's start in reverse order by considering the furthest of the eight planets, Neptune the ice giant. It is between 2.7 and 2.9 billion miles away from us. Neptune has only orbited the sun once since it was discovered in 1846.

Recent images from the James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) reveal its faint ring structure in more detail, and seven of Neptune's fourteen moons. Triton is by far the largest and it orbits Neptune in the opposite direction to the planets orbit (retrograde). Triton is thought to originally been a dwarf planet captured from the Kuiper belt by Neptune's gravity.

As we come closer to earth Uranus orbits between 1.6 and 1.98 billion miles from us. Both Ice giants are so distant that our space probes rarely visit them (which make the JWST key in learning more about them). It turns out that during Voyager 2's fly past in 1986 we recorded the magnetosphere, and we have only just realised that the unusual and unexpected readings were wrong. At the time there was an intense solar wind which distorted the measurements.

We travel on to the Gas giants; Saturn has an elliptical orbit and the average distance from the Earth is 866 million miles. It has the most complex ring system in the solar system. We are now monitoring the stability of the rings, as the inner side of the rings are constantly eroded by Saturn's intense gravity. It's possible that we just happen to be alive at the right time to view Saturn's spectacle, as it may fade away. Next year the geometry between us and Saturn means that the rings will be edge onto us (and essentially be invisible). The rings are up to 175,000 miles wide however the vertical height on average is just 30 feet.

Jupiter is the Gas giant amongst giants, it's average distance from us is 484 million miles. Jupiter is twice as massive as all the other solar system planets combined. The Great Red Spot (storm) has raged for two centuries, but we have only realised recently how variable it is. This was revealed by a three month long observation by the Hubble Space Telescope (HST) which showed it contract and expand in time-frame photography. The JWST has found a new jet stream 3,000 miles wide (the streams on Jupiter revolve in opposite directions) that travels at 320 mph, twice the speed of a category 5 hurricane.

As always astronomy surprises us – even in our own back yard! Have a good festive season all...

I appreciate that this is much used phrase "well I don't know where this year has gone " is being spoken amongst old friends all across the world at this time of year. The good intentions to meet up earlier during the year have evaporated, and here we are trying to cram in, all the promised get togethers into the next three weeks. 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Heyford Allotments

Celebrating the Seasons

The celebrated garden designer, Tom Stuart-Smith recently wrote that we should: articulate the seasons rather than deny them. Every month has it's own beauty – even November! The leaves, turning glorious colours later than ever this year, are a wonderful example of this.

So, the nights are closing in, and although at the time of writing this article, there has been no obvious sign of winter approaching, the growing season has certainly started to slow down. It is a great time to get all those maintenance jobs and soil preparation completed on the allotments and in the garden.

Many Thanks

Heyford Allotments were fortunate to have received several large deliveries of wood chippings from Seb at SAS Arborists and James from JW Tree Specialists. Their support is much appreciated and an indication of how the community can come together to practically support organisations like the allotments. Many thanks to them both.

Allotmenteers have made great use of the wood chippings, especially in creating pathways and as a mulch and weed suppressant around fruit bushes and trees.

Community Saturday

We again held a hugely successful community morning on Saturday 26th October. Over twenty volunteers gave up some of their time to carry out much need maintenance work on the allotments. This included clearing the area around the old Bramley apple tree that has stood on the allotments for as long as anyone can remember. The tree still fruits wonderfully well but was becoming very overgrown and increasingly difficult to access. Thanks to the hard work of our volunteers, it is now in a better condition and easier to get to. Later in the winter we shall carry out some careful structural pruning on the tree.

Other tasks carried out on 26th included creating a new community rhubarb bed, tidying the old raspberry canes and building two "Bramble Towers". These are structures promoted by the Royal Horticultural Society to safely dispose of unwanted brambles and prunings and at the same time create an attractive home for minibeasts and small mammals. If you are visiting the allotments, do come and have a look at them. They can be found on the edge of the orchard.

Without the help of our wonderful volunteers, the allotments would not be in such good condition. At a recent meeting of the Soil Association, a speaker (who also happened to be a Star Trek fan) urged allotmenteers to: *Boldly grow better together!* Now, who would have linked the Starship Enterprise with growing fruit and veg?

Farmyard Manure

To coincide with the Community Saturday we also took delivery of a large trailer load of well-rotted farmyard manure. Allotmenteers have made good use of this and what looked like a very substantial heap of muck, disappeared within a few days. If there is still anyone who has not yet paid Lynda Eales for their barrow(s) of muck, please can they let her have payment as soon as possible.

Dogs

With one or two notable exceptions, dogs are <u>not</u> allowed on the allotments (or the nearby playing fields). We can therefore only assume that the piles of dog mess that we have found in the orchard area, was the result of stray animals. We would kindly ask that villagers do not let their dogs run loose or, if they have strayed onto the allotments, they check their pets have not fouled the area and if necessary, clear up after them.

View from the Wildlife Patch

Today, I was watching our resident House Sparrows in the back garden. They looked chirpy and cheerful, whilst feeding on the commercial mix of seed that we ensure they have all year round. The sight took me back to my formative years on our family farms when countless thousands of these birds came from Birmingham city to feed in our cereal fields. They began to arrive in early June, in time for the young birds to feed on the Aphids that fed on the growing cereals. They then graduated to feeding on the wheat grain as this grew and ripened in the ears. I remember them very well. At the age of 13, at the beginning of the school summer holiday, I was handed a 12 bore, double barrelled shotgun and a few boxes of cartridges and told to keep these birds off the corn. I soon discovered that one shot would send clouds of Sparrows to the side of the next field where they fed happily whilst I made my way to where they were in range. Only for them to repeat the process over again.

In those days the majority of domestic houses had their eaves (the bit between wall and roof) open to the elements. This provided nesting spaces for millions of House Sparrows. That's where their common name "House" Sparrow came from. They also housed thousands of Starlings. Some Starlings nested in holes in trees as they still do. Starlings also had a bad habit of picking up burning cigarette ends to take to their nests. This habit caused many roof fires at the time. It could come as a surprise to those born more recently that there were enough burning cigarette ends lying around for this to be a problem.

Many will remember the millions of Starlings that came to roost in our towns and cities in wintertime. It seemed every single ledge and branch that would support starlings was utilised by a loudly twittering hoard of birds, spaced evenly at "pecking distance" from each other. In fact, there were still murmurations of Starlings over many towns and cities in the mid to late 80's. Now, sharp metal spikes stick up where once there were birds on those same ledges. Plastic boards now cover eaves preventing birds from entering their previous nesting places and we spray insecticide to kill the insects that once fed birds on our cereal crops. I could make a similar case explaining the loss of our Swallows. House Martins (house in the name again), Swifts, Wagtails, Warblers. Almost all of our bird populations are still in decline.

In looking back to those past times, I realise that whilst Climate Change is doubtless a huge factor in the loss of our wildlife, Our own activities and change of attitude also play a big part in this. Every bird nest box we put out does enable birds to find a safe place to breed. Every winter feeder feeds birds. Every "weed" is a wildflower with the potential to feed insects and birds. Every "weed" pulled up deprives something of food and safety. Short "velvet" lawns provide habitat for nothing but grass.

Officially The UK is one of the most natural habitat deprived countries in the developed world. What can **you** do to change that?

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
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
