



Thanks are due to the volunteers who distribute it every month. It is all very much appreciated.

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The March 2025 meeting took place on the 3rd of March at the Baptist Church Rooms.

**Election of a Chairman** - L Hall elected as chair for this meeting.

**West Northants Councillor report** - Cllr. P Bignell reported that WNC had increased the rates by 4.99%, and that £119 million had been saved in recent years. He reported that the Sandy Lane relief road would be completed by May, and that Recycling centres/Tips would be open 7 days a week.

**Police Report** - PCSO E Teagles reported that there had been no major incidents. School parking had improved since the inception of the new yellow lines. It was felt that the lines at the front of the school should be extended up to the driveway. ET confirmed that nobody had been prosecuted for the fires at the Playing Fields; but that the area was now covered by cameras – towards which the Parish Council had given a donation.

**Election** - Posters had been put up and information on the website. The Clerk outlined the procedure

**Flooding Issues** - Disaster Relief Plan/Emergency Plan. This is a work in progress. LD had retyped Jim Arnold's plan and distributed it. Clerk to remind the Environment Agency that Heyford would appreciate a meeting.

**Bliss School Parish Representatives** - To approve 4 representatives. TW reported that the Trust required four representatives to be endorsed by the Parish Council. Resolved. Tony Williams, Sharon Grayson, Tony Clewett and Veneeta Rayner endorsed by the Parish Council.

**Litter Bins and Litter Picking -** Resolved. To accept Shield's quotation. Clerk to ask Shield to empty both dog and litter bins twice per week from April to October. Shield would be quoting for litter picking. Immediate Justice to be checked with regard to litter picks.

**Planning** - No date had been set for the appeal against the refusal to allow gravel extraction.

#### Reports.

**Environment** - AW reported that there was a website which reported river water quality, - this confirms that the river water quality is poor. He had spoken to the MP who would question Anglian Water about this at a forthcoming meeting. Link to be put in the Prattler suggesting residents contact their MP if they are concerned about this situation.

Wellbeing - KSM to be Parish Council rep at Bugbrooke surgery PPG.

**Infrastructure** - IP reported that Highways would invoice for the chicane before the end of the financial year. Canal path project still on track to take place in spring.

Concern had been expressed at the delay in replacing the fallen light at Winston Close. Clerk had been in touch with the insurers of the company whose lorry wrecked the light. They claimed they had no contact details; and when the reference was checked their report was from somewhere completely different. A quote had been given that would enable the light to be moved to a safer position. IP insisted that it was only necessary to move it about three feet and that he would supervise the positioning. Clerk to repeat request for a revised quote. There has subsequently been an insurance pay out for the light, and it has been re-instated.

A resident had complained again about the timing of the light outside her house as she is afraid of the dark when going to work in the morning. Council resolved to maintain their policy of having lights on timers as they were changed over to LEDs.

**Heritage** - Resolved. To approve funding for printing the Heritage leaflets. This would come from funds left over from the Neighbourhood Plan.

Resolved. To approve expenditure of c £900 on a display board and installation costs.

**Community** - LE reported that c £1390 had been collected in allotment rents. Councillors were happy with the plaque for the Bob Smith memorial tree.

Gate at the allotment still had not been replaced by Anglian Water. DM volunteered to follow this up.

**VE Day** would be celebrated on the May 5th Bank Holiday rather than May 8th. Clerk had secured a road closure for May 8th, but it was not yet clear whether this would be required.

**Election May 2025** - Nominations had to be in by April 2nd. As there were only 8 nominations, there will not be an election for the Parish Council. There will be an election for Ward councillors, and there are 10 candidates for 2 seats on WNC.

#### Community Lounge (CL) at the Youth Club in Roberts Field

There will be an exercise programme commencing between 12.30 and 1.30 pm. This the Otago Chair exercises – aimed at the older age group to help promote fitness and balance. This will cost £2.50 per person per session.

The Lounge is open from 14.00 to 16.30 each Wednesday until the end of October. The Lounge is now part of the National Chatty Café network aimed at combatting isolation and loneliness and promoting wellbeing. The volunteers are debating what sort of afternoon programme there should be. Suggestions are welcomed.

The CL is dependent on volunteers to keep it running, and many thanks to Lynda and Karen for all their efforts. If you do have a free afternoon, you are always welcome as a visitor or a helper.

**Parish Council meetings** in 2025 will normally be on the first Monday of each month, (unless a Bank Holiday) and would start at 19.30.

**Reporting Canal Issues** can be done by phoning **0303 040 4040** during normal office hours.

**Reporting Highway and Footpath Issues.** The Clerk will report issues that Council is made aware of, but Council would encourage residents to use the Fixmystreet service to report issues themselves as there will then be no time lag; and first-hand reports are almost always better than 2nd or 3rd hand reports. #### A service for you

I can imagine that for many a list of church services means nothing, nor can you tell whether any of them will suit you. Perhaps the guide below will help you decide what may work for you. You are more than welcome to come and experience something that might reflect how you want to worship.

Our monthly Holy Communion services tend to be more traditional and formal. They give people an opportunity to worship God and to take communion to remember Christ's sacrifice for us. They last about an hour, hymns are sung, bible passages read and there is a sermon from Rev'd Stephen. There is always tea and coffee afterwards to chat, reflect, get to know each other and relax. In Nether Heyford this normally takes place on the third Sunday of the month at 10:00am (and if it's really cold there's often tea and coffee before the service as well!).

On the first Sunday of the month Heyford holds Evening Prayer at 6:00pm. This is a more informal service that provides the opportunity to reflect and unwind. We sing a few hymns, listen to a reflective reading and prayer. This is led by either Rev'd Stephen or a member of the church and lasts between 30 and 45 minutes.

The fourth Sunday of the month is more informal still, and that's Café Church in the Church Rooms at 4:00pm. The service provides the opportunity for more discussion on a particular issue or subject. This takes place over cake, scones, biscuits and the proverbial tea and coffee and lasts for about an hour.

A popular event run every two or three months is Messy Church. This is aimed particularly at young children and always involves some form of craft activity (hence "Messy"), a reflection on faith and refreshment. Parents are welcome giving a great opportunity to chat. It is on a Saturday afternoon 2.00pm to 4.00pm and rotates between Nether Heyford and Flore.

During the year the church holds other services during the week and around Easter, Christmas etc. Look out for these.

We welcome anyone wishing to join us at any of these services. There is no requirement to take communion, donate a collection, come every time, or even stay for refreshments. It would just be really good to see you. We can also arrange lifts for those who would like help getting to the church.

Heyford Parish church is part of a group of churches, a Benefice, connected through geography and our vicar, Rev'd Stephen. We join with the churches in Flore, Stowe and Brockhall. Everyone from across the parishes are welcome to join any one of our services, and hopefully if there isn't one in Nether Heyford, there will be one that suits you in style, timing and locality elsewhere.

The Chapel in Nether Heyford also run services that may be closer to how you want to worship. Please get in touch if you want to know more.



Last year supporters raised over £5 million to help tackle poverty and injustice worldwide.

Congcoop, Christian Aid's partner in Guatemala, supports communities with agricultural resources and training that help them to become more climate resilient. Aurelia, who you can see on this year's envelope, took up the opportunity to gain new skills with Congcoop. She's combining her deep knowledge and understanding of her land with innovative techniques. She's making organic fertiliser, constructing rainwater collection systems, and growing a wider range of crops, including cocoa which she uses to make and sell chocolate. She is now training other women so they can do the same.

#### Astronomy on the Green

An ongoing question may be being answered "Are we alone?" it is such a fundamental question that we have been researching it seriously for almost a century. Is Earth a unique environment in an otherwise life free Cosmos, or not? Our earlier work on this was concentrated on looking for some equivalent to us (the classic little green men) that science fiction gave us. Now though researchers look for what are called 'biomarkers' chemicals that are associated with primitive life forms, notably bacteria and microscopic plant life.

The reasoning behind this is that water is seen as an essential for life, and in Earth's prehistory, life evolved in oceans long before it moved on to land. Planets that may support life (as we understand it) need to live in a 'Goldilocks' zone, firstly this is related to the temperature on the planet and secondly on the nature of the star the planet orbits. Many stars emit enormous amounts of radiation that would scourge the surface of the planet (such as Ultraviolet – which even here we need to protect our skin and eyes from). Finally, water is a prerequisite for life.

We have some targets in our solar system (moons of the gas giants) where liquid water may exist underground (or compacted ice), however we need to send probes to these to sample the geology and emissions of these potentially hidden opportunities. The launching of the James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) expanded our capabilities of searching other star systems for Exoplanets (planets outside our solar system orbiting stars other than the sun). These planets are light years away from us and lie billions, or more likely trillions of miles away.

This raises a question, how can we analyse biomarkers on such remote planets, when even solar system moons are beyond analysis remotely. The answer is that we can look at these planets as they pass (transit) their star. The gas giant moons in our solar system are outside the earth's orbit and we never see them transit the sun.

The instruments on the JWST are sensitive enough to detect chemical fingerprints in the atmosphere of selected exoplanets. Recently one of these has turned up a candidate the snazzily named K2-18b which orbits its star in the habitable zone (Goldilocks). The planet is different to our own, it is 8.6 times more massive and 2.6 times the earths size, 124 light years away in the constellation Leo. Currently the researchers need to refine their work to make the discovery certain but the presence of strong biomarkers (on Earth, DMS and DMDS are only produced by life, such as marine phytoplankton) add to the earlier detection of carbon dioxide and methane in the atmosphere.

We live in interesting times, no little green men, but little green plants.

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#### Heyford Allotments

"What is paradise, but a garden, an orchard of trees and herbs, full of pleasure and nothing there but delights"

I was fortunate to visit two very different gardens over the Easter period and both were equally inspiring. Firstly, a huge National Trust estate in Herefordshire that has just had its cider orchard replanted; 700 hundred trees. It was a mass of Spring blossom; alive with bees and birdsong and the sound of children's voices, playing amongst the trees. The quote above, is lifted from the that wonderful place. Secondly, and purely by chance, we came across a community garden created by the ECHO Charity in Leominster. They specialise in working with people who have learning or other disabilities, with a particular focus on gardening and way in which growing things can have a restorative effect on their lives. Allotment plots, polytunnels, another wonderful orchard and all the things that help make people's lives that much richer (not least delicious cake) were there in plenty. They were even making bug hotels from old cupboard drawers – more on that at another time!

We often bang on about the positive effects that gardening and the outdoors can have on our physical and mental health, and this was probably the best two examples I have come across in a long time.

#### **Community Day**

Continuing on the theme of community involvement, we held our Spring Community Morning on 5th April. Over twenty allotmenteers volunteered their services, as well as some good folk from the village who simply wanted to make a contribution. #### View from the Nature Reserve

As I write this on the 19th of April, We are still experiencing a long drought. The very heavy rain we had earlier didn't really soak into the ground. It caused flooding in many places as it rushed to fill streams and rivers without really soaking into the subsoil to replenish the water table. We really need a lot of steady rain on and off all through the summer months, however this would not be to everyone's taste.

I have been spending quite a bit of time in the reserve area recently and am appreciating the lovely area that is being created by our wildlife. Blue and Great Tits are singing constantly. A Greenfinch was singing. They really do have a beautiful song. Greenfinches have recently faced an enormous population crash caused by a protozoan parasitic "Trichomonas gallinae". This microscopic organism affects the bird's throat, windpipe, and mouth area, rendering them unable to breathe. It was lovely to hear that Greenfinch song again after a few years of near absence

On the Reserve all seems to be well. Cowslips are flowering in good numbers and increasing year on year. Knapweeds are also increasing in size and number as are many perennials. Yellow Rattle, an annual parasitic plant's seeds, are germinating in places. Can anyone explain why it is termed "parasitic"?. It feeds on the roots of other plants, especially some grasses. Humans feed on other mammals but we are not termed "parasitic". I have recently read that the seeds of this plant germinate more freely in places where there is an abundance of the right species of potential food plants.

Some seeds on the newly planted wildflower meadow bed are germinating like "mustard and cress" Unfortunately they mainly appear to be seeds from "Cornfield annuals" that were sown in the plots the first year. This is no great problem. Both mixtures are often sown together in the first year. The annuals grow up quickly to act as a "nurse crop", growing quickly and providing shelter for the slower germinating perennials. This can also help to retain moisture at ground level.

It's also good to see the grass on the established beds forming a thick base. This is providing a haven for the thousands of insects, Spiders and other invertebrates and vertebrates alike, whose populations will be building up at the base of the sward as was planned at the start of the project.

As always there are brambles to pull out. We do not have space to accommodate these otherwise wildlife friendly plants.

As I have written previously we need to be identifying what species are there and recording it on paper. We have identified a suitable document on which to record species. Identification of species has never been easier with tools like Google

Lens. I watched one of our Grandsons using this App and realised how, with a little practice, anyone can become an efficient wildlife recorder. When we have found the best way to use both the recording sheet and ID App, we will be asking for volunteers.
