

The Annual 2025 meeting took place on the 12th of May at the Baptist Church Rooms.

Election of Chairman & Declaration of Acceptance of Office Resolved. Ms L Hall elected as Chair and signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

Election of Vice Chairman and Acceptance of Office Mr A Williams elected as Vice Chair and signed the Declaration of Acceptance of Office.

Report From West Northants Council No report. Our Ward Councillors are Phil Bignell, and Debra King. Council is familiar with Cllr Bignell, but has had no contact with Cllr King as yet.

Public Participation PCSO Emma Teagles asked for comments on her report, and announced that there would be knife amnesty at the village hall.

Two waste bins had disappeared from outside the Village Hall, one of which was paid for by the Parish Council. The reason for the removal had yet to be discerned. Clerk to contact WNC again.

Residents complained that branches on the Limes opposite the One Stop were very low and causing discomfort to pedestrians, also that cars were parking on the pavement and that the pavements on the North side of the Green needed to be restored to their original width. Queries regarding parking were referred to the police.

Election There had been eight nominations for the eleven seats, and therefore no need for an election. Throughout West Northants only 10% of Parish and Town Councils had required elections. The situation was very different with the ward councillors with most wards being hotly contested; including ours.

Two of the vacancies were filled at the May meeting. Christopher Legget and Justine Legget were co-opted as Councillors.

Planning AW reported that local councils are losing powers to Central Government as the number of houses needed gets re calibrated. The Neighbourhood Plan runs until 2029, but will need refreshing.

Gravel Extraction Appeal At the time of writing the result is not known. Council has done everything that it can to stop the appeal against the original refusal for permission, and it is hoped for a positive result for the community.

Reports

Infrastructure IP reported that proposed work on the canal towpath was now in doubt due to changes of circumstance and illness among the main proponents, and safety issues. IP to discuss with Cummins. It was suggested that Barclays and Immediate Justice could be approached

Resolved To ask WNC to reinstate the waste bin outside the Village Hall.

Resolved To ask for quotations for a crown lift to the Limes opposite the One Stop shop.

Community LE reported that the gate had been fixed, and that there were 3 Allotment plots available. She reported that the Bob Smith memorial plaque was in place. The Community Lounge had held a VE Day afternoon tea with a period display and food.

Flooding TW reported that Anglian Water appear to be carrying out various works, and would like to be kept informed. The PC will need to ask Highways to do the kerbing work in Watery Lane. The WNC flooding report should be available shortly.

TW reported that an FOI request had confirmed how poor the river water quality was, and this was because of the poor state of the Stowe Hill treatment plant which overflowed almost every time it rained, with raw sewage getting into the river on a weekly basis, approx. 50 times per annum. Despite this there are no plans to upgrade the facility until 2030.

Village Fete took place on the 14th after having to be cancelled (due to bad weather) on the 7th. Congratulations to all involved in creating another splendid event. The Green was in first class condition, and the fete shows off our green at its best.

Parish Council meetings in 2025 will normally be on the first Monday of each month, (unless a Bank Holiday) and would start at 19.30.

Reporting Canal Issues can be done by phoning 0303 040 4040 during normal office hours.

Reporting Highway and Footpath Issues. The Clerk will report issues that Council is made aware of, but Council would encourage residents to use the Fixmystreet service to report issues themselves as there will then be no time lag; and first-hand reports are almost always better than 2nd or 3rd hand reports. Dear Friends,

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." (Mark 6:30-31)

Does it seem as though the world is getting faster and faster? And our lives busier and busier? Despite all the labour saving and time saving devices, despite the immediacy of the internet and social media, we seem to have less free time than ever. Perhaps the world slowed briefly a few years ago, as we struggled with the pandemic, but now life is as fast and full-on as ever.

The summer holidays which begin in July offer us all a time to pause and to rest, whether that involves time away, or simply creating space for rest and refreshment at home. Astronomy on the Green

As I write this, we approach one of the prime events of the season. The summer solstice being the longest night of the year and our 'going over the hill' pointer towards winter. We know that this has been a celebrated event for thousands of years. People constructed Stonehenge (and probably an earlier wood henge) for rituals based on astronomical events. Builders constructed wooden and later stone circles with the greatest possible accuracy. Stone henges were less likely to damage and rot than wooden ones. This is an early example of humans revising structures to improve their effectiveness.

Roll on to the twenty-first century and scientists improved on the well-loved Hubble Space Telescope with the James Webb Space Telescope. They opened a whole new can of worms for cosmology. As so often, new technology has revised our scientific understanding of the cosmos. We had a nicely laid out plan for how the universe began, yet suddenly it doesn't match our new understandings.

As we look closely at the period just following the Big Bang (the cosmos lighting up about 13.6 billion years ago) there is far more structure than we expected. We see this particularly in galaxy formation. Our current models cannot match the speed at which the early galaxies appeared. They are just too structured, too early. Evidence also suggests that too many elemental gasses abound. This points to the rapid evolution of ancient stars. Once again, we cannot account for this.

Thinking caps on. Could this suggest that the singularity contained information to produce the universe? If so, how? I have been reading around this Penrose and Hawkins won the 1988 Noble prize for their theory on singularities. In 2020, Penrose won again, illustrating that black hole formation was a robust prediction of the theory of general theory of relativity.

It was at first thought that black holes emitted nothing, but Stephen Hawkins proved they were radiators. This raises the question: could information falling into a black hole (normally considered destroyed) be stored in the singularity? If so, at the end of one universe, could the singularity that began it contain information from earlier universes? Penrose is a long time believer in the formation of a universe as an ongoing perpetual loop. He's still thinking about it all at 93 years old.

Don't ask me. I'm as much in the dark as anyone else. I've wondered about this enough, to be honest.

We have had a busy time at WI. In the June of each year over 5,000 members attend the National AGM held at The Royal Albert Hall. However, this year things were different. I attended the meeting which was held at WI head offices in London, via Zoom. Technology is amazing and I even voted electronically on the resolutions.

Yes, it was a little strange to sing Jerusalem and God save the King, all by myself in my office, but no one could accuse me of being out of tune. I really enjoyed the day; it was encouraging to hear that 59 new WI's had been formed and that there were 22,000 new members across the country. The WI has its own lottery and a podcast. Each month 5,300 women take part in free courses run on the digital Learning Hub.

The guest speakers (who give their time for free) were interesting. Emma Bridgewater spoke on how she rescued a failing pottery in Stoke on Trent and turned it into the successful brand it is today. Angel Strawbridge (of Escape to the Chateau fame) was entertaining telling us about her life in France and how her interest in all things vintage started back in the 2000's.

At a local level, we thoroughly enjoyed our visit to Weedon Depot. After a spot of lunch at the Crossroads, we assembled at the visitor's centre for a guided tour. It is hard to imagine, as I write in the sweltering heat, that on that Thursday afternoon, it rained all afternoon. Not to be deterred, we just carried on regardless. The guides were full of interesting stories relating to the long history and importance of the depot as the centre of Ordnance for the British Army. We were served tea and biscuits afterwards in the centre and everyone agreed that "we hadn't realized that there was so much history on our doorstep".

We must thank the Village Hall Committee for all the hard work that they had put into organising another successful and enjoyable village fete on June 14th. It was great to see so many families supporting the event. Long may it continue.

At our next meeting on Thursday July 3rd at 7.30 we are welcoming Anita Gayton who has published her first book" Staying Alive: My Ride with Ovarian Cancer". Anta's story is told with optimism and humour. We recently discovered a huge allotment site not one minute's walk from the Royal Crescent in Bath. Lower Common East Allotments were created from common land in Bath in 1830. Today it is a thriving community of gardeners who have created their own version of paradise in the middle of a busy city. The following statement, posted on notice boards by their entrance gates, beautifully sums up why we do what we do.

Allotment gardening allows individuals and groups to grow their own fresh, often organic, fruit and vegetables. They provide physical exercise and welcome relief from the daily stresses of modern life. Allotments are great for local biodiversity and encourage recycling through composting and reuse of everyday items. The diversity of allotment holders encourages social cohesion and there are educational benefits to new gardeners and children alike.

Keeping in Touch

At the time of writing this article we have several vacant plots on the allotment site, large and small and none of them expensive to rent. They have been strimmed and covered with landscape fabric so taking on the plot should be less demanding. Slowly peeling back the covering and cultivating just what can be managed at any one time is a good way to come to terms with an allotment, especially if you are new to allotmenteering.

View from the Nature Reserve

As I begin this article, I can hear our own colony of House Sparrows noisily chirruping above my head. They nest in boxes placed under the eaves of our Bungalow. Adults, nestlings and fledglings are equally noisy in and around these nests. House Sparrows, Starlings and Swifts, all suffered badly when the UK shifted from leaving the eaves of our houses open to the weather to boxing these eaves in. Firstly with wood, then with the ubiquitous plastic boarding, that is now familiar on almost every building in the land. Whilst this change improved all our lives in many ways. It is a fact that it made whole populations of birds homeless at the time. In recognition of this I made and sighted a few Sparrow nest boxes just under our eaves. Now we have at least 8 families of Sparrows twittering above our bedrooms. throughout the year

Last month I brought up the subject of Usuto Virus. It is a virus which is killing our Blackbirds. This subject is much too big for this magazine. If you haven't already done so please type "Blackbirds - Usuto Virus" into your search engine and you will have all the necessary information about the virus and what you can do in the fight to minimise its effect on our blackbirds.

Do you feed Hedgehogs in your garden? It's been 3 years since we began to feed hedgehogs in ours. They continue to eat around a litre of Calci Worms almost every night of the year - with only a three week break in January. I am not seeing many Beetles, Earwigs etc. around these days. Which Hedgehogs need to stay healthy. Calci Worms should replace much of this lack of insects. Remember DON'T FEED HEDGEHOGS MEALWORMS. These do not contain enough Calcium for hedgehogs. It has been proven that feeding Mealworms causes crippled Hedgehogs. Feed Calci Worms instead. They cost less and contain the ideal level of Calcium for Hedgehogs. They will always get other vitamins and minerals from any insects they do find elsewhere.

On the Reserve the deep rooted plants are still flourishing and Yellow Rattle is consuming most of the grasses. This is not what was expected to happen but it is a perfectly natural process. The best we can do is monitor the situation, and act as needed. We have two new plant arrivals on the reserve. One is Common Hogweed (heracleum sphondulium). A very common plant found on almost every roadside verge in the area. The seed is designed to be wind bourn. However, ours probably arrived on someone's feet. Being so common a lot of insect species will depend on its flowers. Therefore it has the potential to be an asset as long as we don't allow it to take over.

The other new arrival is Hoary Plantain (Plantago media). This is very attractive for a plantain, being the only British plantain that is pollinated by insects. I have no

idea where this came from. It is not especially rare but likes calcareous soils, which we don't have locally. However, it is a very welcome addition to our flora.

We have Marbled White Butterflies on the reserve for the first time. They could be just passing through so I will not get too excited yet. Our mowing regime is designed to accommodate just such insects.

Watch this space.


