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The October 2025 meeting took place on the 6th of October at the Baptist Church Rooms.

#### WNC Road Sweeping Schedule

WNC have attached a copy of the current schedule that we are working on up to the end of the calendar year. This schedule is subject to change at any time to meet service needs. It is Nether Heyford's turn between Nov 17th and 21st. If you park your vehicle on a section of road that needs clearing please bear these dates in mind.

#### **West Northants Councillor report**

Cllr PB referred to the closure of the road to Upper Heyford between Oct 10th – 22nd. Traffic lights to be put in. Some signage and road markings have been added to the "road to Nowhere" on the A4500 near Harpole. He then referred to the introduction of booking at the tips in the area. This is to ease the flow. PB was unsure about change of use at Heyford Hills farm, where a café relocating from the Depot at Weedon intended to open.

Concerns were expressed about the number of lorries going up Furnace Lane attempting to access a new distribution depot at the former Wickes site. PB would investigate. AW would go to their office.

#### **Public Participation**

A resident complained about the condition of a front garden facing the green. AW stated that the PC has no powers regarding residents' gardens. He then complained that the dog waste bin on the Weedon Road, was on the ground and that the bins were often overfilled. He complained that a gate at the allotments was faulty. He then complained that there were problems with vehicles passing each other on the Pound when there were events at the Village Hall. It was felt that this was only an occasional issue, and not one that Council had any powers over.

It was Resolved to accept the External Audit. Resolved. To accept the findings of the External Auditors. There were no recommendations, but a weakness was identified in that the review of the Asset Register had not been minuted.

WNC Parish Conference – to choose delegates. 23rd October Resolved. Chair and Clerk to attend, with clerk to be paid appropriate overtime. KSM to attend if there was a place.

#### **Gayton Road bridge**

Bugbrooke PC had asked for assistance in lobbying WNC regarding the closed road between Bugbrooke and Gayton. Clerk to write to Highways pointing out the inconvenience of the detours this closure causes.

#### **Church Clock**

Resolved. To pay half of the cost of the clock repairs. Council routinely pays for the maintenance of the church clock, as it has the power to do so, and it is felt to be in the interests of residents regardless of which religion, if any, that they follow. This is not to be seen as a precedent.

#### Precept for 26/27

Clerk distributed copies of a document showing expenditure for the year so far set against the budget. This showed that expenditure was generally on track and within the limits set.

#### Flooding Issues

Disaster Relief Plan/Emergency Plan was progressing. Sand and bags had been donated by Paul Isgar and Beck Aggregates of Weedon. Council thanked them and all those involved in the filling of the bags. There was discussion about how items should be purchased, and a budget was awaited.

#### NCALC Conference report

Clerk reported that this had been an useful networking and information gathering event. The keynote lecture had been about the move towards ever bigger council units taking them further away from the people, and making parish and town councils even more important, with the theme that "Bigger isn't necessarily better". Both WNC and NNC Council leaders admitted that their planning departments were "experiencing difficulties".

#### **Community Health Champions**

KSM reported that she had completed the MECC "Making every conversation count" course. She will receive and cascade information from the county health services and is already posting on Facebook.

#### Communications

KSM felt that communications should be formalised so that funding opportunities were not missed. A lengthy discussion ensued as to how best to disseminate the information.

#### Planning - Gravel

AW reported that he was waiting to hear about the initiation of a liaison group and recommended applying for funding from the Mick George Community Fund.

**Parish Council meetings** in 2025 will normally be on the first Monday of each month, (unless a Bank Holiday) and would start at 19.30.

Reporting Canal Issues can be done by phoning 0303 040 4040 during normal office hours.

**Reporting Highway and Footpath Issues.** The Clerk will report issues that Council is made aware of, but Council would encourage residents to use the Fixmystreet service to report issues themselves as there will then be no time lag; and first-hand reports are almost always better than 2nd or 3rd hand reports. Dear Friends,

[God] will judge between many peoples and will settle disputes for strong nations far and wide.

They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore... (Micah 4:3)

Last month, I led a service of commemoration at Brockhall church, where we unveiled a plaque remembering those people from twelve different nations who trained with the Special Operations Executive (SOE) at Brockhall during the Second World War. The service was attended by representatives from the embassies of Thailand, France and the USA, whose nationals were among the SOE trainees over 80 years ago.

That commemoration seems especially appropriate this year, as we mark eighty years since the end of the war in Europe and the Far East, recognising that the sometimes-fragile peace we enjoy across Western Europe today is founded on the courage and sacrifice of many, many people. Among them, are those people we honoured at Brockhall last month, many of them from the occupied territories of Europe and the Far East including Denmark, the Netherlands, Thailand, Czechoslovakia, France, Austria, Norway and Hungary. Men and women who trained at Brockhall in preparation for dangerous missions behind enemy lines as saboteurs and spies, radio operators, raiders and resistance fighters.

Eighty years ago, their courage, commitment and sacrifice helped bring victory against the Axis powers. Joy and celebration burst out across the country to mark the end of the war, first in Europe and then in the Far East. But even then, as now, the kind of lasting peace foreseen by the prophet Micah (above) was a long way off, a peace that is more than the absence of war, a peace that is about wholeness and wellbeing and justice for all. Over the last eighty years, great things have been achieved through dialogue, through shared effort, through international cooperation, and the efforts of former enemies to seek reconciliation and common purpose. Yet the hard-won peace for which the Brockhall trainees strived seems more fragile than it has since the end of the Cold War. In the aftermath of the recent global pandemic, war again blights the continent of Europe and the wider world, the menace of tyranny, and the growth of right-wing sentiment all create new challenges to peace.

In the face of such challenges, I hope that we will be inspired by the incredible bravery of the Brockhall volunteers, and I pray that Micah's vision will spur us on in our efforts to secure a lasting peace and a kinder, simpler world - in our homes and communities, in our nation and beyond.

#### Astronomy on the Green

This year has been a poor year for amateur astrophotographers. A combination of clouds and during the heatwave's high altitude cloud. The second type of cloud is more frustrating as the sky may appear clear to the eye, but after setting up your telescope it's obvious that you won't be able to image anything. For this reason, I look at the sky through binoculars to see if there is any haze. However, we set up telescopes in the daylight (for both ease and safety [I had a black eye for a while by altering my setup in the dark]).

Still, I'm hopeful of getting going again now that the darker, colder nights are with us. Some of the best imaging is done in the early hours, as astronomical darkness is reached around two hours after sunset. Even then, a drop in temperature is very handy as it takes moisture out of the atmosphere. Yep, we want to be in the cold and dark until we have our system set up and imaging (normally for several hours; at that point, a warm room and coffee are essential).

Imaging for that long a period needs specialist mounts for our telescopes. If you use a standard 'camera' type of tripod, which moves only up/down and left/right, you would limit your work. Because of the rotation of the Earth, stars sweep across the sky in a delicate arc. The Earth rotates at a speed of around 646 mph at our latitude. In 15 to 30 seconds, the star trails will be obvious. This also means that the subject will rotate slowly as it crosses the sky from east to west.

In the early days of astronomy, these adjustments had to be made by hand, and this limited the exposure time for which images were captured. Computerised mounts now automate the process and take care of crossing the meridian. The meridian is an imaginary line at 90 degrees where east becomes west. If this is not dealt with, the telescope will eventually hit the mount. Again, this was done manually, but now the software counts down to where it crosses the line and automatically reverses the position of the telescope. Most of us will go outside to ensure this completes without a hitch, and that imaging has restarted.

With this level of automation, we can easily expose for 90 seconds, or, with a good polar alignment, we can go up to 5 minutes. When imaging a nebula or galaxy, we will take 200 to 300 images to enhance the image. We then 'stack' all the images to reveal the composite result. Then, like all photographers, we play with the image in software until it is finally complete. Some objects are so distant and dim that we run captures for several consecutive nights to get the best data we can.

So, the question is – are we nerds?

Yes, to a man - we are.

#### Heyford Allotments

#### **Community Flower Patch**

In our last article we discussed ways in which to garden with a changing climate. It is something we are all going to have to learn to do. With this in mind, we are planning to reduce the amount of annual bedding we plant in the community flower patch, in favour of herbaceous perennials i.e. plants that die back every winter but regrow and flower again in the summer.

Perennials have the advantage of deeper roots and can therefore better withstand periods of drought. As they age, they form larger clumps that can be divided in the autumn or early spring and thereby provide free plants. This process of division is also an important feature of garden care as it reinvigorates plants and makes for better growth in subsequent years.

If you have any surplus perennial plants and would like to find a good home for them, we'd be only too happy to take them off your hands. Plants like Achillea (Yarrow), Alstromeria (Peruvian Lilly), Japanese Anemone, Aster (Michaelmas Daisy), Helenium (Sneezewort), Phlox, Penstemon and Rudbeckia would be perfect. If you can be of help, we would be immensely grateful. Either put the plants in the cut flower area in the coming weeks or drop me a line and we will come and collect them from you. It is interesting to note that more and more florists, keen to use more locally sourced plants, are turning to locally grown perennials.

#### **Harvest Festival**

The Parish Church of St Peter and St Paul held their annual Harvest Festival on the allotments on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> September. It was well attended and the weather was kind. We welcome these events. It is good to see the Community area being so well used.

#### Keeping the Allotment Safe

Considering the allotments in Heyford are an "open site" and, unlike other towns and villages, we do not resort to high fences or locked gates, we suffer from very few incidents of vandalism or theft. That is an indication of good community spirit and the pride shown by people in our village. That philosophy was one that the late (and much missed) Geoff Thorneycroft was so keen to promote when he set about developing the playing fields and encouraging more people to use that space. If we all keep an eye on places like the playing field and the allotments, they will be safer, more welcoming spaces for everyone.

A quiet word to the younger members of our community from parents and carers about this subject is very welcome and never goes amiss. If you or your children use our community areas all we ask is that you treat them with respect; clear up any litter, put chairs and tables back where you found them and remember that allotment plots are <u>not</u> for public use. Please don't trespass on them. If you like them that much, get in touch and rent an allotment of your own!

#### **Hedge and Gate Maintenance**

Hedge cutting will take place during the late autumn and early winter. Every effort will be made to avoid debris falling onto pathways that border the hedge. We also plan to repair the heavy gate by the Watery Lane entrance so that access to the allotments and playing field is easier.

#### **Community Morning**

We will be holding our next Community Morning on Saturday 1st November between 10.00.am and 12 noon. If any villagers would like to help with some basic maintenance tasks for a couple of hours, that would be really appreciated. We always seem to get so much done in such a short space of time. Help us keep the allotments looking good.

#### Give it a go

If you fancy rising to the challenge of "growing your own", we currently have just one vacant plot on the allotment site (complete with several mature fruit bushes). It has been strimmed and covered with landscape fabric so taking on the plot should be less demanding. Slowly peeling back the covering and cultivating just what can be managed at any one time is a good way to come to terms with an allotment, especially if you are new to allotmenteering.

Remember, new plots do become available throughout the year, so if you are interested later on, do get in touch with Lynda Eales from the Parish Council and she will appraise you of the current situation.

#### View from The Nature Reserve

Over the last 2 years, I have been experimenting with "rewilding" at home by letting our 2 front lawns grow without being mown over the summer months. After some evaluation I can now say that I have mixed feelings about the process. The plan that I followed was to begin with an early mow in March, with the cutter set at 75mm whilst removing all cuttings. Then not mowing again till September. By then, the grass should have stopped growing and most grassland wildlife ceased activity. However, by the end of the September of 2024 I found that Garden Grass Moths, (Chrysoteuchia culmella) and Common Meadow Grasshoppers, (Corthippus brunneus) were still feeding and flying. We also had Yellow Meadow Ants (Lasius flavus) -These are tiny ants that live in anthills, mostly on grassland. They were accompanied by the tiny eyeless, white "Ant Woodlouse" (Platiarthrus hoffmanseggii). These little woodlice are said to live with most ant species, but I find them mostly in Meadow Ants nests. In 2024 I found that both ants and woodlice were still active well into the last week of September so deferred mowing till the middle of October.

This year lawns were mown to 75mm again, taking off all of the mowings that could otherwise suffocate the new growth. During Summer 2025 I found no more invertebrate species than in the previous year and I was disappointed that there were no ants of any species present. Later in the year, Grass Moths and Field Grasshoppers were present in about the same number as the previous summer. The project has been successful in increasing biodiversity as neither species would have been there if I mowed the grass as in the previous 10 years. Also, the results were somewhat skewed as much plant growth was cut off in early summer by the drought that seems to have affected the whole of the UK. I have just returned from 2 weeks in the North Scottish Highlands where large areas of black ground testify to the wildfires of Summer 2025. These would not have happened had the vegetation not dried out. We will review the situation with our lawns at home and take advice, but I expect to leave most of the grass uncut again throughout next Summer.

At the time of writing we still need to do the late mow on the Nature Reserve. All of the long vegetation, including the tall Knapweed will soon be cut off to 75/80 mm and the cuttings removed and put in a large pile that will then rot down. When we first began the practice of putting vegetation in heaps, some of us had dreams of Grass Snakes hibernating in the rotting vegetation. They also use the same heat source to incubate their eggs. Last July, I was overjoyed to come across a large female Grass Snake sunning herself on the reserve close to one of the heaps.

It is good to see the plant species list increasing year on year. Our aim is to increase biodiversity there.

The fence around the Reserve is now getting worse for wear. Mostly this is due to the wooden posts rotting underground. We will soon be putting in some bigger corner posts with supports that will retain the tension on the main fence. This will reduce the tension on the small stakes, making them less susceptible to breaking.

A combination of notes can have the most spine-tingling effect. It is so nice that we have two new members this year (one Tenor and one second Soprano) and they are enjoying the challenge of harmony and being part of the family of singers.

As we all know, singing has many functions. One of the most well loved organisations is the Alzheimer's Society 'Singing for the Brain' which brings people with dementia and their carers together to sing which improves brain activity, wellbeing, mood and supports the memory and energy. There is an increasing amount of evidence that singing releases endorphins, serotonin and dopamine – the 'happy' chemicals that boost your mood and make you feel good about yourself.

And now new Mums who are suffering with the debilitating Post Natal depression are encouraged to attend a singing group. Scientists believe that's one of the reasons why people report being on a high during choir sessions and continue to feel positive, uplifted and motivated afterwards. It also counts as an aerobic activity as it introduces more oxygen into the blood so give up your gym classes and sing in the Village Hall instead! We often take our lungs for granted but most of us rarely use them to their full capacity (unless you do Pilates or other such specialised activities) but singing requires you to sing in a controlled way which helps increase lung capacity. So please think about all the reasons you should be singing and join us in January when we start rehearsing for the Spring Concert. And in the meantime book your tickets for Christmas.
